Addressed by Rev. James Dunlop at Annual Church Service

SEES WORLD RISING TO BRIGHTER LIFE

Present Time Great One of Opportunity—Exhorts Hearers to Duty.

In his ringing challenge to the members of the Pythian order at their annual service yesterday afternoon, Rev. James Dunlop declared that it was not enough for them to be faithful members of their order but there rested on them also the obligation to carry forward Christ's Kingdom in these Maritime Provinces and to be worthy followers of the splendid pioneers who labored here for Christ.






