LIBERALS MAKE GAINS; CUT
DOWN BORDEN'S MAJORITY
Have Captured Three Seats in Manitoba—Sir Wilfrid Laurier Will Lead Opposition in Parliament

Montreal, Sept. 24.—Following is the standing of the parties according to the latest returns:

Deferred elections—Gaspé and Chicomout; Saguenay in Quebec, Thunder Bay in Ontario and the Yukon.
Late election results in Quebec show Belloc as having gone Conservative, so that the standing in the province is: Conservatives and Nationalists 27, Liberals 36.
In Ontario, East Algoma seems to be going Conservative, though all polls are not yet in.
In Saskatchewan, Qu'Appelle and Saskatoon, reported Conservative have returned Liberals. In the former constituency Mr. Lake, a Conservative stalwart, was beaten.
In Macleod (Alta.), Perron, Conservative, is now reported beaten, leaving only one Conservative, Bennett, of Calgary, in the province.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will remain at the head of the Liberal party, and lead the opposition when the new parliament meets some six weeks hence.
Sir Wilfrid would personally prefer to take the opportunity of seeking a well earned rest from the constant stress and strain of public men and gratify his long held desire for hours of leisure in his library. His decision to remain at his post as head of the party is because of the general desire of his colleagues and supporters, and because he believes that he has “a work to do” for Canada. He is following the precedent set by Gladstone who, after defeat, again led his party back to power.
Mr. Borden arrived in the city this morning and was met at the station by Mrs. Borden and by a few friends, including George Perley, who is slated as the next minister of finance. A local demonstration in his honor is being arranged for Tuesday night.
Speculation is rife as to the extent to which the axe will be wielded by the new government. It is expected that a few heads will be diminished, but the rule that civil servants should keep out of politics has been generally and faithfully observed and not more than a half dozen or so changes are expected.

R. K. Y. C. Races
Three dory races held by the R. K. Y. C. at Millville on Saturday afternoon proved very interesting. The winners were the boats of Messrs. Blizard and McAvity and J. G. Lively, two firsts. These two boats carried the first prize of \$75 and the second of \$50 respectively for the series of dory races during the season. The third prize has not yet been awarded. The auto service to Millville was tried and proved a success.

Championships in Montreal
The Canadian track and field championships were held at the M. A. A. grounds in Montreal on Saturday afternoon. The Irish American Athletics from New York were the big winners, carrying off eight, firsts, three seconds and one third, thus scoring a total of thirty-one points. Matt McGrath of this club broke the Canadian record for the 16 pound hammer throw, by hurling it 102 feet 2 inches and established a new world's record when he tossed the 56 pound hammer 40 feet 3 inches. Athletes from the Boston A. A., Toronto Central Y. M. C. A. and Montreal A. A. also competed.

WATCH-BOYS IN NORWAY

They Sit in High Sentry Boxes and Look Out for School of Fish

It is common enough to see a boy watching cattle to keep them from straying, but a watch boy whose duty it is to keep a lookout for a school of fish, and who sits in a sentry box set upon stilts, is not such an everyday sight.

This particular kind of watch boy is Norwegian, the scene of his labors being the shores of some fjord of his native land.

His little sentry box is made of wood and perched high upon posts. Here the lad sits, gazing out across the sea, using his keen eyes for the benefit of the farmers who are depending upon him to give the alarm when a school of fish shall appear. They work contentedly enough in their fields, secure in the belief that their watch boy will let them know when it is time to reap a harvest from the sea instead of from the land.

When the signal is given they leave their work, throw the huge nets over their shoulders and hurry off to their boats.

Sentry boxes similar to those employed in Norway were in use among the fishermen on the shores of the Mediterranean, and it is supposed that the Vikings brought back with them from some of their piratical raids the idea that has been put in practice ever since. —The London Chronicle.
