RESIGNS AND WILL SUPPORT JEROME

Charles A. Flammer Urges Election of Jerome as District Attorney

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Charles A. Flammer tonight announced his resignation as republican candidate for district attorney and appealed to the members of the party to support the candidacy of Wm. Travers Jerome. Flammer's resignation was announced in a statement given out tonight in New York.

"When I accepted the republican nomination for district attorney I did so in good faith and full expectation, if elected, of being able to serve the people of this community honorably and well.

"As a member of the republican party I desire to put myself in accord with the best tradition of that party in leading sound public sentiment by not continuing my candidacy for district attorney against William Travers Jerome, and in response to a request today as the sense of the majority of the best citizenship in this community, I retire as a candidate for district attorney.

"Though the thought is apart from the principle which occasions my retirement, I am hopeful and confident that my action must assist in the unification of those citizens opposed to the continuance of the administration of this city by McClellan, Murphy and Tammany, in the support of Mr. Davis for mayor, in which, with other good citizens, I am vitally interested."

District Attorney Jerome refused to talk on the subject tonight.
