DIFFERENT LAWS PREVAIL ON
OPPOSITE SIDES OF THE STREET

A remarkable condition of affairs as regards state laws is to be found in the little city of Bristol, Va.-Tenn. with a population of twenty thousand, and divided equally by the state line, which runs directly through the center of the principal business street. Bristol has lately gained notoriety by a local option election held in the Virginia half of the city on July 8, when it voted to license the sale of whiskey again by a majority of 23, while the other half of the city is under "state wide" prohibition, being in Tennessee. The peculiar geographical location of the city makes necessary two municipal governments, and consequently two mayors and two sets of city officials. President W. W. Finley of the Southern Railway recently remarked of Bristol that it was so good that it took two states to hold it.

In State street, the principal business thoroughfare, the state line runs directly down the center of the street, and for more than a mile, a novel plan of evading the Tennessee "Jim Crow" laws developed when a law requiring negroes to ride in the rear of the cars and apart from the whites was passed in the Virginia half of the city. Recently a Down East drummer who had forgotten the difference in the laws of the various states found himself one day in Bristol. He walked into a drug store on the western side of the street. "Give me a package of Turkish cigarettes, please," he said. "We haven't any cigarettes," was the reply, "but we can let you have almost anything else you want, from morphine up."

The drummer was puzzled for a moment, but decided that he must have misunderstood the clerk. "I want some cigarettes," he repeated. "No cigarettes in Tennessee," answered the clerk, "but you can get them across the street. That's Virginia."

Thinking the clerk for his information, the drummer crossed to the other side of the street and laid in a supply to last him his trip across Tennessee. He reached the door when a thought struck him. "Have you any morphine?" he turned to the clerk and asked. "Sorry, sir," replied the Virginian, "but we are not allowed to sell any drug store on the other side of the street. That's Tennessee."

The same is true of revolvers and small firearms. They cannot be sold on one side of the street without committing a felony, while the windows of hardware stores and sporting equipments on the other side usually contain a large display of them.

IMMUNITY FROM ARREST.
In Bristol the police and other officers of one side of the street cannot have jurisdiction on the other. It is not unusual for persons to commit crime on one side of the street, step fifteen feet across the state line to the other side of the street and be immune from arrest, except by having been extradited papers, which the police resort to only in cases of high crime, as the Governor grant the papers only in case of felony.

However, the laws of each state are rigid, and it is only in minor cases and with professional criminals of whose conviction they are certain that the officers will resort to kidnapping.

PROLONG SALOON LIFE.
This situation operated to prolong the life of the saloon in Bristol. Twenty years ago Bristol, Va., voted dry, with the understanding that the other part of the city would do likewise, but it failed to keep its promise when the time came. It was put up to the Tennessee part of the city to take the initiative, which it did. Bristol, Va., followed suit, and in May, 1910, voted to abolish her saloons and null order liquor houses, doing a business of saloons annually. In the Tennessee fight it was freely charged that the Virginia half of the city was going dry to get saloons out of the other half of the city, with a view to changing later and getting all of the revenue itself. Monterey Scene of

LAREDO, TEXAS, Aug. 29.—Direct communication with Monterey was re-established by the Associated Press at 10:30 tonight. The operator at that point says that the number of dead will be 1,200. The Monterey News was compelled to suspend publication for two days owing to high water.

Graphic Account.
LAREDO, TEXAS, Aug. 28.—With partial re-establishment of communication with the flooded section of northern Mexico today, a graphic account concerning loss of life and property damage is being received. Semi-official reports state that at least 1,200 dead bodies were recovered in Monterey at noon today.

Swamp Everything.
The destructive flood, due to the continued fall of rain for the past six hours, swept everything before it and hardly a vestige of what was a few days ago a flourishing town was left. The number of dead bodies recovered in Monterey at noon today was 1,200. The flood reached its crest between one and three o'clock today, and the water was so high that it was impossible to reach the higher ground.

BERESFORD TO TALK ON NAVY
Britain in Grave Danger, He Thinks, and Will Tell Canada So.
MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 28.—Lord Charles Beresford will conduct an active naval campaign in Canada. OFFICIALS TO WAR
ON DEADLY HATPIN
Prefecture of Paris Police to Issue Drastic Regulations Regarding Its Wear.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The officials at the Prefecture of the Police are considering what steps it is possible to take with a view to preventing the recurrence of the serious accidents caused by the murderous hatpins worn by women.
