PASSES SAVING TO CUSTOMERS

Dominion Stores Takes Under Two Cents Net Profit Per Dollar In 1931

It is interesting to note from the report of Dominion Stores Limited that with sales for the last year at a new high figure in the history of the company, the net profit is less than two cents for each dollar of sales. In other words, out of every dollar spent with Dominion Stores, more than 98¢ was paid out to the manufacturer of goods.

In wages to its own twenty-five hundred employees, and in transport costs to the various railway and trucking companies, leaving less than two cents for expansion of the business and for dividends for those who have invested in the enterprise.

Canadians living in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, bought from the Company last year, groceries, vegetables, fruits and meats to the amount of \$25,000,000 compared with \$24,100,000 in the previous year. Profits, after operating expenses and provisions for Federal Income Taxes, were \$22,630.00 compared with \$519,907.00 for the previous year, or a decrease of 95.6 per cent, although the sales increased over one million dollars.

"This indicates clearly that Dominion Stores Limited has endeavored to pass on to the public without delay every decrease in food cost that occurred during 1931," said W. B. Connick, manager of the Montreal Division of the Company, in an interview. "Our plan of turning over our stocks rapidly and buying only merchandise required for immediate sale, allowed our customers to take full advantage of an average decline of 16% in the price of food stuffs."

"No one hopes for an improvement in general conditions more than we do, but our customers may rest content that during the present period of low prices, we will pass on to them every possible saving."

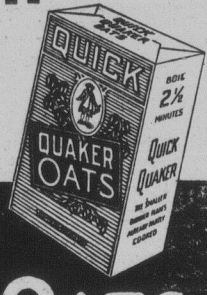

Fish does, however, build firm flesh and strong muscles and should be served as often as your family enjoys it.

For a well balanced meal in which fish is to be served the following menu is suggested:—

Tomato Juice Cocktail

Baked Fish Steaks

Maitre d'Hotel Sauce

Baked Potatoes

Fresh Vegetable

Salad — French Dressing

Magie Lemon Cream Pie

Condensed Coffee

The recipe for Magie Lemon Cream Pie given below with the recipe for — may be used to good advantage.

The filling is made of sweetened condensed milk, eggs and lemon juice.

The lemon juice thickens the sweetened condensed milk in an instant and no further thickening is required for the pie filling. When the Uncooked Pie Crust is used this pie requires only as much time in the oven as is needed to brown the meringue. It practically "bakes" in the refrigerator!

FISH STEAKS

Fish Steaks — Salt — Pepper

Sweetened condensed milk

Out fish steaks (any type of boned fillet — cod, halibut, etc.) about 3/4 inch in thickness. Place these in a dripping pan. Place two strips of bacon in a cross shape on the steaks.

Sprinkle with salt and pepper. (Any of the meat sauces — Tobacco, etc. may be used to good advantage.)

Nearly cover the steaks with sweetened condensed milk. Place in moderate oven (350°F). Allow to become thoroughly done.

MAGIE LEMON CREAM PIE

1-3 cups sweetened condensed milk

1/4 cup lemon juice

Grated rind of 1 lemon

2 eggs

2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Baked pie shell.

Blend together sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice, grated lemon rind and egg yolks. Pour into pie shell which was baked in an eight inch plate or use Uncooked Pie Crust.

Cover with meringue, made by beating egg whites until stiff and adding sugar. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F) until brown. Chill before serving.

UNCOOKED PIE CRUST

Roll enough graham crackers to make one cup crumbs. Mix with 1-4 cup condensed milk. Line buttered plate, packing mixture well. Pour in filling and bake until meringue is browned.
