Along towards midnight of that same day he rang me up at my hotel to say that Mr.Carvell had informed him that he would be in Toronto the next morning to talk over what evidence he (Rogers) had to offer. At three o'clock the next afternoon Rogers came to my room in the Carls-Rite Hotel and told me that he had met Mr. Carvell and had showed me a roll of bills that he said Mr. Carvell had given him. As I knew he was dead broke in the morning the evidence was convincing had Mr. Carvell come to the 'phone on the other end. After he (Rogers) had talked with Mr. Carvell he asked me to speak to him, and in the hearing of a third party (Rev. Robert K. Lambert, a Methodist clergyman from Beeton, Ontario), I asked Mr. Carvell what he thought of Ro ers' story and what he intended to do with it. Mr. Carvell said to me, 'It sounds like good stuff-I shall go to New York with him (Rogers) to see if he can make good.' When I had hung up the receiver I turned to Rogers and got him to go over the story a second time and had my conversation that Rogers said Mr. Carvell had agreed to pay him \$200 a veek and his expenses to go to New York and get him the correspondonce that could be used against the Shell Committee. The first two hundred dollars was to be sent to him that afternoon by a lame man. Half an hour later when a friend of mine who is lame in both feet came to see me, Rogers demanded of him the money that Mr. Carvell was to
