GREY LAG SHOULD SURELY GO WELL AS FOUR-YEAR-OLD

Winner of \$61,346 at Three for Rancocas Stable Was Troubled With Injured Front Feet Last Season and Will Return for Brilliant Career in 1922.

New York, Dec. 19.—Those who recall Grey Lag when he was at the top of his form the past season have a recollection of a colt of the greyhound type, deep in the bristles, thin in the flank, and with the long, plant muscles of the stayer. He reminded old-timers of the type of horse that did things over a distance of ground a generation ago, and while he was beaten in four of his 13 races, there was an excuse each time for him, and he was unquestionably the best three-year-old of the year, winning nine races of a total value of \$61,346 out of 13 starts, and finishing second in another to his stable companion, Mad Hatter.

In winter quarters it is a different story. Grey Lag that appeals to the horse-lover. He is no longer the lean emaciated of the distance runner type of thoroughbred. His well-rounded girth betokens a life of ease at Rancocas farm, from which so many champions have been sent to conquer the turf on the race courses of the world.

It is historic ground which Grey Lag treads these days, for from the paddocks near Hoboken, New Jersey, where the place was owned by that fine sportsman, Pierre LeJolliffe, went two great and famous champions to England, the former to win a Derby and other classics and the latter to trounce some of the mightiest of the handicap division at all distances.

Greydrop and Wanda, famous fillies in their day and generation, were also sent from Rancocas, and so was Captain, the holder of the world's record of 1:33 1/5 for a mile. Democrat, the great two-year-old crack of England some years ago and afterwards the charger of the ill-fated Lord Kitchener of Khartoum, was another product of Rancocas in the period when Mr. Lord was racing in England, with Lord William Bessford as partner and John Huggins as trainer.

Grey Lag is worthy to be classed with the great and gone dead, which were developed with few hours from New York, and as he is as sound as the day he was born his record next year as a four-year-old should be one of the greatest brilliancies.

Given English Preparation.
Sam Hildreth, who trains Grey Lag, is not easily moved to criticism, but in talking of Grey Lag a few days ago his eyes glowed as he told how the Star Shoot colt had raced the greater part of the year a crippled filly. It appears that Grey Lag was specially prepared for the Kentucky Derby. In order to be absolutely sure of his quality the colt received his final workouts in the English fashion—against tried competitors instead of the water. There are two tracks at Rancocas, one a mile and five furlongs in circuit and the other six furlongs. Breeding Horses For Hunting Field

Canadians Lead in Producing the Proper Types for Cross-Country Purposes.

New York, Dec. 19.—The increasing demand for thoroughbreds by the devotees of the hunting field is most encouraging to the breeders of the country. They realize that the wider the market for the produce of their studs is going to provide an outlet for those sleek warlike colts which are not desirable for early racing because of their size, or too slow in their paces to be successful against well grown two. Many of these big colts were bought by hunting men the past season at figures which were satisfactory to their breeders.

The growth of the hunting movement in the east has been the chief cause of the increasing influence in the population of the thoroughbred, which was for a long time regarded by many as fit for little beyond the confines of the race course.
