## Belief 173 More Men Have Perished

Southern Cross Has Not Been Heard From for a Week

Yas So Deeply Laden She Car. ried Her Coal on Deck-Agonizing Scenes Identifying Dead of Newfoundland -Mother Found Four Sons Among the Victims---Father and Boy Clasped in Death -Many of Survivors Lose Hands and Feet.

St. John's, Nfld., April 5-Anxiety pened tonight for the 178 men on the ling steamer Southern Cross, which ard. She was not reported either by neoming vessels of the sealing fleet or by the steamer Kyte, sent out by the covernment to search for her. By sunet tomorrow, if she is not heard from, he will be officially posted as lost with ll on board.

As the public learned today from the Newfoundland's survivors who were landed yesterday the details of the two days' blizzard and the condition in which it caught the Southern Cross, the first hopes, based on the stoutness of the ship, faded. Captain Daniel Martin, of the sealer Erik, and Captain William Bartiett, of the Terra Nova, which arrived with full catches, were dubious regarding the safety of the missing ship. Neither had seen her within a week.

Captain Martin said he parted company from her a week ago Thursday, when the Southern Cross turned homeward with 17,000 seals. She was so deeply laden that all her provisions and part of her bunker coal were stored on deek so that every available space below could be filled with her catch.

Cantain Bartlett of the Thera Nove

was wallowing slowly down the coast. Other ships of the fleet sighted the steamer driving before the gale last. Tuesday morning. She has not been reported since and the skippers of the fleet who came through that gale and the storm of equal severity later in the week say every chance was against a vessel so deep in the water as the Southern Cross. One woman found two bodies clasped so tightly in death that they could not be separated. They were her husband and son. The lad was wrapped in his father's arms as if the man had been trying to shield him from the pitiless

cold.

The hand of another dead man was missing. One of the survivors who had lain helpless near the body for nearly forty-eight hours, said that his comrade, unable to stand the agony of frost bite, had sliced off the hand with his seaman's thife. man's knife.

Of the thirty survivors in the hospita none is expected to die, but the majority will never be fit for active service again. Three lost both hands and both feet. Five lost both feet. Each of eight others lost a foot and eleven will lose a hand fingers. The others will bear scars

Some of the survivors said the shelter from the Arctic gale behind the bodies of dead shipmates, but in all the delirium of the two days and nights of exposure the bodies of the dead were left inviolate. Each man of the 150 endured his lot with grim patience, and each one, the dead as well as the living, was found with his full equipment of clothes, boots and sealing gear intact.

By Tuesday, when special memoral services will be held, if the Southern Cross fails to show up, the families her 178 men must be provided for well as those of the Newfoundian dead and crippled.
