Mails for Australia and New Zealand hitherto forwarded by way of England. will in future be sent by way of San Francisco, the first despatch to be made by a steamer leaving San Francisco on Saturday, 31st January. Subsequent despatches will be by steamers sailing on every fourth Saturday from that date. The rate on letters, by this route, for New Zealand and New South Wales is 15c. per half ounce-and newspapers 4c. each. The rate on letters for other parts of Australia is 10c, per half ounce and on newspapers 4c. cach. The rates above given prepay correspondence in full to New Zealand and New South Wales, but correspondence for the rest of Australia will be liable to a further charge on delivery.
