

Careful study of the period shows that the political and economic up. heavals, the transfer from feudal aristocracy to monarchy, the transfer from agriculture to commerce, the loss of the common lands to the peasant leading those led to the minds should be so starved that, in great movement for progress rather than Luther's "95 Theses." There was a great political, economical and intellectual change, as well as a religious change. One who will read "The Social Side of the Reformation" by Belfort Bax, will see how sadly over-rated the work of Luther is, for even his religious advance was largely paid for by others.

In his attitude toward the peasants Luther shows himself either a traitor as dupes to his own end and then
