### Report of Special Committee.

Board of Trade's Special Committee  
Presents a Fine Programme.

At the last regular meeting of the 1906 Board of Trade a special committee was appointed to draw up a programme for the coming year. The report presented read, as follows:

#### MEDICINE HAT BOARD OF TRADE

A meeting of the special committee appointed to prepare a programme of work for 1907 was held in Mr. Kealy's office on Friday December 21, 1906. P. L. Crawford, presiding, H. E. Bennetts, O. W. Kealy, W. C. Harris.

It was resolved to report as follows:

To the members of the Medicine Hat Board of Trade,

Gentlemen,

As your committee appointed at the general meeting held in the city hall on Friday December 14th, for the purpose of drawing up a programme for next year's work, we beg to report as follows:

We consider four things are necessary for success:

1.—Suitable offices.

2.—A competent commissioner.

3.—A campaign fund.

4.—A programme of work.

We recommend as follows:

1. That a competent secretary of the Board of Trade and publicity commissioner be appointed at a salary of \$1500 a year to devote his whole time to the work.

2. That a bureau of information and statistics be opened under the charge of the secretary.

3. That a building be erected in a prominent position near the railway station as Board of Trade office and information bureau. That such building be placarded with the name of the city and concise information about the natural gas, the climate, etc.

4. That the C.P.R. be asked permission for the erection of the foregoing building on the corner of Main and South Railway streets.

5. That a subscription list be at once opened for the purpose of raising a fund of \$3500 per year for the next three years for the above work.

6. That the city council be asked for financial statistics and to facilitate the work of the Board in every possible way.

7. That by-law No. 1, section 2, be amended by striking out the special qualification for membership with the object of letting any ratepayer become a member by the payment of the present fee.
