GIRL SWEARS SHE SAW TWO MURDERED

New York, May 16.—Nellie di Carlo, fourteen years old, of 235 Mulberry street, made an affidavit yesterday that she had witnessed the shooting which resulted in the deaths of Policemen Heaney and Teare and John Rizzo last Saturday night a week ago. As a result of her statement, Michael Shillitani, of No. 21 Mulberry street, father of Oreste Shillitani, "The Paper Boy Kid," was locked up, charged with homicide.

In the girl's affidavit, according to George H. Dougherty, Deputy Police Commissioner, it is stated that on the night of the triple murder she was leaning from her window. She saw Oreste and his father come from the rooming house in the basement of the tenement, and after walking a few paces the latter gave the former something which she thinks was a revolver. The younger man hid it in his coat.

They returned to the doorway of the rooming house, and soon afterward Rizzo came out, eating a sandwich. Oreste fired at him and he fell. Then Policeman Heaney ran up and as Oreste covered him with a revolver, he struck the man with his club. Oreste shot and killed him. She says that she became frightened, closed her window and went to bed. The elder Shillitani, the police say, admits that he saw with his son prior to the shooting, but denies that he gave to his son a revolver. In view of the girl's statement, the police are taking the utmost care of her to see to it that no harm befalls her. She is in the custody of Mrs. Isabella Goodwin, lieutenant and matron in the Police Department.
