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The following letters, among others, were submitted by Mrs. E. C. Atwood, Washington, D.C., to Mr. King, in support of her application for an appointment under the Industrial Relations Department of the Rockefeller Foundation:

September 23, 1914 - Letter from Senator James H. Brady of Idaho to Hon. David F. Houston, Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, in which Senator Brady says:

"Mrs. Atwood formerly lived in Idaho, having large business interests there, and while I was Governor of Idaho, I appointed her to represent that State at the National Rivers and Harbors Congress held in Washington, D.C., as a delegate to the International Irrigation Congress held in Sacramento, Cal., and to the American Mining Congress in Pittsburgh, Pa. I am not familiar with Mrs. Atwood's movements from 1909 until I came to the Senate in 1913, but I understand that she has done splendid work in North Carolina along various lines of civic improvement, which give positive evidence of her energy and executive ability. . Mrs. Atwood has had wide experience in journalistic and publicity work and the great credit she reflected upon my own State of Idaho, and my knowledge of the beneficial work she has done elsewhere, leads me at this time to commend her to your favorable consideration, for I believe that she will be eminently successful in putting into effect the work you have in view."

September 26, 1914 - Letter from Messrs. F. M. Simmons and Lee S. Overman, Senators from North Carolina, to Hon. David F. Houston, containing the following:

"Mrs. Atwood is a woman of fine intelligence, education and full of enthusiasm and energy. For some time she has been running, successfully, a newspaper in North Carolina, known as the "Southport News".

September 21, 1914 - Letter from Mr. Grosvenor G. Dawe, Founder of the National Chamber of Commerce, and former Editor of the Nation's Business, containing the following:
