Gentlemen: -

With reference to your letter of the 26th of March last, submitting an offer of Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars for the burnt spruce, pine, and hardwood timber on the Franklin Manor Indian Reserve in Cumberland County, N.S., estimated at about five hundred thousand feet B.M., I beg to inform you that your offer is accepted on the condition that you will pay cash in advance and agree to leave the maple ridge about twenty five acres, intact, which the Indians have requested the Department to reserve for their future use as a sugar bush and only take trees actually killed by the fire or dead as a result of it.
