

- A. Yes, I saw him in the evening.
- Q. How long was that after he drove away from BHQ in the 15 cwt?
- A. It was approximately three quarters of an hour after.
- Q. How did he behave in the guardhouse?
- A. He behaved well.
- Q. Did he appear to be normal?
- A. No he looked rather like a crazy man, he was not normal.
- Q. What was he doing which made him look like a crazy man?
- A. By his eyes and his doings.
- Q. Did you at any time that day smell alcohol on him?
- A. No sir.
- Q. Were you at the guardhouse on guard that night of the 20th/21st?
- A. No sir, I wasn't on duty.
- Q. Did you see Brisson the following morning?
- A. Yes sir, I saw him for breakfast.
- Q. Did he appear to be normal at breakfast?
- A. He didn't want to eat.
- Q. Did you notice anything other than that appearing to be the matter with him?
- A. No sir.
- Q. Did you have any conversation with him that morning?
- A. Yes, I asked - I talked to him and asked him if he wanted to have breakfast.
- Q. Did you have any further conversation with him that morning?
- A. During the day and the following afternoon I talked to him.
- Q. Will you tell the Court what you talked to him about?
- A. We talked and chatted together.
- Q. Do you remember what you talked about?
- A. No sir.
- JA: Capt Currelly I feel it my duty to remind you that you are not bound to not ask leading questions in your cross-examinations, you may lead the witness if you wish.

- Q. Did you talk to Brisson about a German Concentration Camp?
- A. The accused is the one who spoke to us about that.
- Q. What did he tell you?
- A. He is the one who spoke to us about it, he could not remember anything, it seemed he thought he was apprehended by the Germans.
- Q. Was there any conversation about what had happened the previous evening?
- A. No sir.
- Q. Did you or anybody else in your presence indicate to him that anything had happened the previous evening?
