A BAD RECORD

No Less Than Six Convictions Have Been Recorded Against Jarvis

Toronto, Jan. 6.—No man is better known to the police of this city than the man who is held at Windsor for the shooting of Sergeant Nash. The records refer to him as George, alias Samuel, Jarvis, alias Geo. Henderson, alias Geo. Johnson. His convictions here are as follows: April, 1896, theft, one year; April, 1897, theft, two years and six months; November, 1899, five charges of housebreaking, six years. For attempting to escape he was given an additional six months on December 14, 1892. His last sentence was imposed at Chatham for burglary on September 15, 1897, when, in company with a brother, he got seven years in Kingston. A sentence of three years, to run concurrently, was imposed for carrying a revolver. After his discharge last fall he was seen on the streets of Toronto. His mother, who is a very respectable woman, lives in Toronto.

In 1897 there was a burglary near Chatham. The Maple City police were notified. On the following night the police located three men at the Idlewild Hotel who proved to be the burglars. Officers Deszella and Groves went to make the arrest. The man giving the name of Will Harris was found in bed. He attempted to draw a gun on Tom Groves, but Tom saw the play in time and grappled with the man. The big policeman wrestled the gun from the man. Harris is the same man Jarvis who shot Sgt. Nash.

P. C. Tom Groves is keeping the revolver as a souvenir.
