Operative and MinorSurgery—Course of oper-) ations on the cadaver ; bandaging ; application of splints ; hæmostatics ; catheterism, &c.
Prescription and Prescribing — Lessons in Prescription writing and the act of Prescrib- ing; weights and measures; officinal and non- officinal preparations; grammatical construc- tion of Prescriptions; dosage for adults and children; hypodermic medication; medicinal combinations; incompatibility. Weekly.
Diseases of the Throat—Method of examina- tion; use of instruments; general Pathology and Therapeutics; acute, chronic, tubercular and syphilitic laryngitis; functional disorders; pharyngitis; tonsillitis and diseases of nose, pharynx and nasal cavities.
Diseases of Children—Anatomical and physiolo- gical peculiarities of infancy and childhood; mode of examination of sick children; peculiar- ities of symptoms; therapeutics and dosage; consideration of the more common and impor- tant diseases of childhood.
Morbid Anatomy—Consisting of twenty de- monstrations in the autopsy room of the Hos- pital. Students will make the post-mortems in rotation, and receive instruction in the me- thod of performing them, and keeping record of their observations.
Museum Instruction—The Curator will give in- formation and instruction upon the specimens to any students who may care to attend. Days and hours to be hereafter named.

All students desirous of attending the above courses are expected to register their names with the Registrar *within one week* after the beginning of the Session, and to pay a *fce* of \$15, when a ticket will be issued admitting to the lectures, which ticket must be presented. Enregistration and payment of the fee are compulsory upon all students, whether attending one or more of the classes.

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
