It may be well to remind the congregation that in order to enable obligations to be met, we are dependent upon the large offertories which may reasonably be expected on the two festivals of Christmas and Easter, but especially the latter. We should have \$150 on Easter Day of this year, in order to make the payments which ought to be made, namely, sundry accounts \$60, and \$100 towards interest; this last, over and above receipts through envelope contributions, being less than the Bishop has been expecting the congregation to contribute.

The Sunday School has received an acceptable gift of five dozen Bibles from the S.P.C.K., sent out at the instance of the Rev. J. McArthur, a

member of the Executive of that society, who visited and preached in St. Alban's when passing through Toronto last summer, and was much interested in our work and undertaking.

Mr. Longley Taylor's Lecture on Britain's Empire in the East, on 15th ult., was well attended, and was extremely interesting. We are not informed as to the financial result, but do not doubt that it was satisfactory.

A pleasant incident was the recent visit of Bishop Awdrey, of Osaka, Japan, who, accompanied by Mrs. Awdrey, passed through Toronto en route for England, recently, and rested awhile at the See House, being present and preaching at the morning service in St. Alban's on Sunday, 21st ult. Immediately after the service he had to resume his journey in order to catch the steamer by which he was to cross the Atlantic. Although we do not usually consider it our part to say much of distinguished visitors, we cannot let the present occasion pass without noting how greatly those who were so fortunate as to meet Bishop Awdrey personally were captivated by his dignified presence and courteous manner, in which he is well supported by Mrs. Awdrey. These minor, though important, items, added to his manifest ability, and the circumstance of his being the only Bishop who has left an English See to take up work in a foreign land, make him an ideal missionary Bishop.

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
