### Questions and Answers.

#### Veterinary.

#### Septic Lymphangitis.

Horse had septic lymphangitis. The lameness has disappeared but sores, which refuse to heal have broken out. The right fore leg is also affected. He is swelling between the fore legs. The hair is falling off in small patches, leaving a matted sore. A. M. S.

Ans.—The septic condition has involved the whole system. Keep his bowels moving freely. If necessary to do this give a pint of raw linseed oil occasionally. Feed on good hay, a little rolled oats and bran, and a cup full of linseed meal daily, also give a few raw roots. Give 6 drams hyposulphite of soda three times daily. To the sores that refuse to heal, apply a little butter of antimony once daily with a feather for three or four days. Dress the raw surfaces three times daily with a lotion made of 1 oz. each of acetate of lead and sulphate of zinc to a pint of water. Dress the dry surfaces and those denuded of hair three times daily with 1 part carbolic acid to 30 parts sweet oil. V.

#### Miscellaneous.

#### Keeping Bees.

1. I am thinking of keeping bees, and would like to know where I could get the best information for a beginner.  
2. How many hives would you suggest keeping the first year?  
3. About what price are they per hive? M.M.

Ans.—1. It is advisable to get some practical information from a bee-keeper. Information can also be gleaned from books on the subject. The Honey Bee, by Langstroth, and A. B. C. of Bee Culture, by Root, may be secured through this office for \$1.60 and \$2.25 respectively.

2 and 3. It all depends on the man and the time that he can devote to the bees. If nothing is known about bees it is advisable to start with a few colonies. The number could be increased as one became familiar with handling them. The price depends a good deal on the season and the strength of the colony.

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
