Colonial. TROOPS AND MENTIONS OF WAR.—On Tuesday morning the Steamships Asia and Adriatic, from England, and the Peria, from Sicily, arrived at this port. The Asia brought out 9 officers and 80 men belonging to the Royal Artillery, a field battery with four guns, and 117 men of the same corps. 17 officers and 303 men of the Military Train; 3 staff officers, and 180 tons of cargo, consisting of warm clothing and camp equipment for the troops. After landing the stores the Asia proceeded to New York.

American States. PARTELOPH TO COLONIAL SPIRIT.—CORRESPONDENCE FROM LORD LYONS AND SECY. SEWARD, RELATIVE TO RELEASE OF SEIDEL AND MASON. NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—The official correspondence relative to the seizure of Messrs. Mason and Seidel is received. The first document is a letter from Secretary Seward to Mr. Adams, our Minister in London, dated Nov. 18th, in which Mr. Adams is notified of the arrest of Messrs. Mason and Seidel, as a new and unforeseen circumstance, which is to be met, if possible by the two Governments, in a kindly spirit. It is stated that the British Government was furnished on the subject, and no explanation was furnished to Minister Adams, it being deemed prudent that the ground taken by the British Government should be first made known here, and the discussion take place at Washington. Mr. Seward deemed it necessary to state to Minister Adams, that the British Government, without instructions, and the subject was therefore free from embarrassments that might have arisen, if the act had been especially directed. He trusts the British Government will consider the subject in a friendly temper, and it may expect the best disposition on the part of the Federal Government.
