His Excellency's speech to both Houses

Gentlemen of the Council,

" And Gentlemen of the Affembly,

"AVING given my affent to fuch bills as you have agreed "upon, I conclude it would be fruitless longer to de"tain you at present from your private affairs. I shall therefore
dismiss you from further attendance at this time in General
Affembly, and once more express my hope, that such provisions, as yet remain unsettled, may at a future meeting be completed in the manner most conducive to the real interest and
Reputation of the province. It is not, indeed, without serious concern that I observe another year's delay of payment to
the persons employed in the public service. But, though I
lament the inconveniences that may be suffered by individuals, it is no small consolation to restect that, in the mean time
the general prosperity of the Colony is still advancing, and,
I trust, will continue to advance, with an uninterrupted progress."

General Affembly prorogued. And then the Clerk of the Crown, by His Excellency's command, declared the General Assembly to be from your differently in May next.
