LIVE STOCK MARKETS. TUMONTO.

Receipts of live stock at the City Market were 75 carloads, composed of 1428 cattle, 931 hogs, 89 sheep, 129 calves and

There were a few lots of good cattle, but many were common, half-fed on sale to-day.

Trade was much the same as at the Junction. Some of the drovers stated that prices all round were not as good as on Monday.

Exporters-A few odd lots of export steers sold up to \$5.85, but there were few shipping cattle on sale. Export bulls sold at from \$4.25 to \$5, and an odd one or two of extra quality brought \$5.25 per cwt.

Butchers-Prime picked lots of butchers sold at \$5.50 to \$5.75; loads of good at \$5.20 to \$5.50; medium \$4.85 to \$5.15; common \$4 to \$4.25; good cows, \$4 to \$4.75; rough cows \$3.50 to \$3.75; canners \$2 to \$3 cwt.

Feeders and Stockers-Messrs. H. & W. Murby report a fair trade in stockers and feeders, which are becoming more plentiful as the season advances, but not equal to the increasing demand. The Messrs. Murby bought 200 stockers and feeders at the following quotations: Good steers, 1000 to 1100 lbs each, at \$4.75 to \$5; good steers, 900 to 1000 lbs. each, at \$4,25 to \$4.75; good steers, 800 to 900 lbs each, at \$3 90 to \$4 25; good steers, 600 to 800 lbs each, at \$3 25 to \$3 50; light stockers, 400 to 600 lbs each, at \$3 to \$3 25.

Milkers and Springers-About fifty milkers and springers sold at \$30 to \$60 each, and one extra quality cow at \$70, the general run of the good cows selling at from \$45 to \$55 each.

Veal calves-The run of calves not being as heavy as that of last week, prices were just a shade stronger. Prices ranged at from \$3 to \$5 50 per

Sheep and lambs - Receipts light. Export ewes sold at \$4.50 to \$5.25; rams \$3.50 to \$4.50; yearling lambs, \$6.50 to \$7.50; spring lambs \$3 to \$6.50.

Hogs-Receipts light. Mr. Harris reports prices unchanged, but slightly easier. Selects, \$6.40, fed and watered, and lights \$6.15.

OLD COUNTRY CRIMINALS.

That the increase of crime in Ontario is due to the importation of undesirables from the old country is charged by Dr. Bruce Smith, Inspector of Prisons for Ontario, in his annual report, which has been presented to the Government.

Dr. Bruce Smith states:-"Although that have been in confinement in the in guilty. jails of Ontario within the past twenty years, this increase is not due to increase in crime in the Province, but is largely due to Canada, and especially Ontario, being made the dumping ground during the past year of some most undesirable immigrants. Every jail I have visited within the past six months has had among its prisoners persons who have been only a few months in this country. Some of them have spent most of their lives in English prisons. Several have admitted that they have been discharged by English Magistrates on condition that they would emigrate to Canada.

There must be something radically wrong with our immigration regulations that will permit such apparent neglect in the inspection of persons seeking and obtaining passage as immigrants to this country. 
