## LONDON SHORT OF PENNIES

### Millions of Pennies Go Into Children's Money Boxes.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—London is short of pennies. It has plenty of sovereigns, half-sovereigns and half-crowns—in the banks, but these very banks are bankrupt of pennies, and welcome the man who cares to walk in with change for a shilling in coppers.

"We have bags upon bags of gold," said a city bank manager yesterday, "but I would gladly give you 5,000 golden sovereigns for their value in copper coins." But since he would not guarantee a commission no one would stir to oblige him.

The shortage is due to a number of causes. In the first place there always has been a shortage a month or so before Christmas. Every father-families will tell you that every child has his money-box, where coppers have been accumulating since January 1. And so some millions of pennies are thus withdrawn from circulation before the end of the year.

Again automatic "penny-in-the-slot" machines are now in the ascendant. Sweets, cigarettes, railway tickets, and gas bills are paid in this way.

"Indeed we have to send our barrows round to the gas companies for pennies very frequently," said the bank manager. "They are the mainstay of the banks."

The authorities at the Royal Mint have written in answer to the appeals of the banks in the despondent. "Sorry, but we can't help it," write. "We have issued over 8,000,000 bronze coins in the course of the last three months," said an official. "We are coining far more than our annual average, yet we do not seem to be able to give the banks as many as they want."

The Insurance Act has, of course, increased the demand for small change.

"For every three pounds worth of coppers in previous years, we must have quite ten pounds worth to-day, if we are to pay our men their correct wages," said a large employer in the city.

**SARAH BERNHARDT'S SOLVED PROBLEM.**

A new story is being told of Sarah Bernhardt. At the great theatre in Paris where a new play is being rehearsed, difficulty arose over a scene in which one of the characters makes a purchase of eggs. The problem lay in the correct method of "wrapping them up."

Sarah Bernhardt decided to settle the question by practical experience. Ordering her chauffeur to stop at a dairy in the Rue St. Denis, she walked into the shop and said: "Madame, I want half a dozen eggs."

The dairy woman required a moment or two to recover from her astonishment at the sight of this fine lady. Then she took six eggs from a basket, wrapped them up in a bit of old newspaper, and handed them to the actress.

The problem was solved—and Sarah's chauffeur that evening dined on a splendid omelette.

**PAPER MODEL OF GASOLINE ENGINE.**

A paper model of a gasoline engine has been made by a Boston inventor to illustrate the construction of a new type of aeroplane motor, which he has devised. Ordinary writing paper and nothing else was used. The engine is part of an aeroplane device designed to enable a pilot to throw off the motor, propeller, wheels and gasoline tank of his flying machine in case of accident.

Experiments made in the Old Country with synthetic and natural indigo have proved that the natural dye is far superior to the chemical substitute.

This should bring heart to the greatly worried indigo planters of Behar and Bengal.

During the last fifteen years the one time great indigo industry of India has been brought to the verge of extinction by the chemical substitutes invented in Germany. Twenty years ago the cultivation of indigo was one of the most lucrative industries in India. The best indigo gave a profit of nearly 33 1-3 per cent. upon outlay.

The original planters, who at the beginning of last century had taken over the methods and means of producing the dye from the Dutch, became wealthy men, and in their sons had brought to India the best class of unofficial European that the peninsula had known.

Then came the synthetic indigo, which in ten years completely revolutionized the indigo districts. The cultivated young men left for fields that gave a better return for their talents, while the old indigo concerns reduced their output of the dye, and took to the production of sugar, jute and flax, and to the production of a precarious existence, where in the near past all had been wealth and success.

"Good," said the man, "I guessed just right," and walked off.

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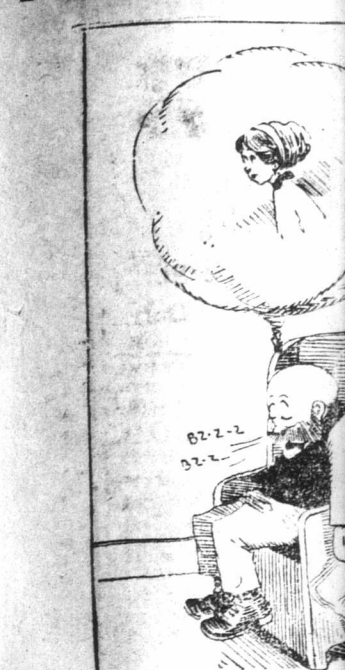
