

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land the District. Entry by proxy may be made taken. at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties-Six months' residence upon and years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at cultivation of the land in each of three least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per

Duties-Six months' residence in each of Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead when the description of the conditions are the description.
