GAOL BREAKERS ARE SENTENCED

Three Years for James Cooper, One Year for Two Others.

Simcoe, Feb. 7.—(From our own correspondent.)—Norfolk's three outlaws were disposed of yesterday morning by his honour, Judge Bolos. James Cooper, the oldest of the three offenders and a married man, had put up a good program for about two years. His stunts were:

1. Desertion from the Norfolk battalion.
2. Desertion from the Woodstock battalion.
3. Escaping from custody when arrested on the first count.
4. Escaping from gaol.
5. Escaping from gaol.
6. Horse stealing.
7. Burglary of country store.

He managed yesterday to get a discharge on the charge of stealing his father's horse a few days ago, after he had sworn his way out of gaol. He established that he had an interest in the deed. To the other charges he pleaded guilty. Minor sentences imposed, did not appear to have any salutary effect on his career.

Breckenbury was sentenced to gaol on default of payment of a fine of \$200 for a breach of the temperance act. He joined in the gaol-breaking and burglary a fortnight ago, and pleaded guilty. He is single. His family live in Brantford. The younger Cooper's career was outlined yesterday. He pleaded, during the afternoon, not guilty of forgery, but guilty of receiving money obtained through the forgery of his chum, and was given three and one half months, to run concurrently with his former sentence.

To Fight Germany at Home
Carrying out the War Lectures Bureau's programme, Rev. A. B. Furney gave a five minute address at the Lyric picture show at 7.30 last night. It was the first of a series to be given.

Mr. H. P. Innes, who has undertaken to circulate the information introduced the speaker, and the address was short and to the point. Canada the Biggest Country in the War.
Mr. Farney began: We are the biggest little country in this war. We loaned the government \$400,000,000 last year and \$300,000,000 worth of cheese and \$50,000,000 worth of agricultural products and as much of other products of Canada. We are now making ships in a score of places. Our last market for the sale of securities has been closed. We must buy our own securities, and lend our own money, and lend more this year than last. We must produce more, than last. We must produce more, deny ourselves more, and must not buy out of our own country unless it is absolutely necessary.

These Three Things:
We must practice self-denial. We must produce to the limit. We must lend more.
Last year one in eight of the population loaned to the country. One in four should in 1918 loan double what we loaned last year. The reverend gentleman was applauded enthusiastically.

have begun early Monday morning. Despatches from Stockholm Wednesday, said that General Mannerheim, who is acting under authority of the Finnish diet, had captured Uleaborg, in northern Finland and also had taken Tammerfors, which is 100 miles northwest of Helsinki, the Finnish capital.

Poles Insurgent
Petrograd, Feb. 6.—Ensign Krylenko, the Bolshevik command chief, has issued a decree ordering that all supplies be cut off from the Polish legion in the Russian army, and declaring its commander, Dymkor Mousnitsky, an outlaw. He also appeals to all Bolsheviks to leave Polish commands.

The decree was prompted by the refusal of the Polish commands to reduce their officers to the ranks, and submit to Bolshevik democratization. Ensign Krylenko says that the Polish officers are under the control of the Polish bourgeois, who are unwilling to submit to popular rule.

A wholesale despatch received at Berlin from Kiev, and forwarded to Amsterdam Tuesday, said that Ensign Krylenko and his staff had been arrested by the insurgent Poles.

STRIKE SLACKENING
Amsterdam, Feb. 7.—A semi-official telegram, dated Monday, received here to-day from Berlin says: "The number of strikers in Greater Berlin is declining to-day. A large number of works again are operating. In other big armament works the number of those at work varies from 75 per cent. of their full complement. A further statement is expected to-morrow, so that the strike may now be regarded at an end."
