Christopher Reed, ex-corporal in the N.W. M. P., was next called. He had been on duty last year when autopaies on certain bodies had been held and he had taken notes at the dictation of Drs. Thompson and Hurdman who were conducting the autopsies; witness was present at all three autopsies, those of Relfe, Clayson and Olsen; witness had been hospital steward in the police ervice for 8 years and it was his business to attend autopsies. On cross-examination, witness said the physicians had partially examined his notes but had not looked over every note as made; he was not sure but thought the book containing his notes was handed to Inspector Scarth. He had previously identified his notebook when produced by the prosecution.
