### Kentville Baptist Church And Highbury's Name.

Dear Editor:  
Two things in recent issues of The Advertiser brought to my memory certain facts which may be of interest to some of your readers.

One relates to the Kentville Baptist Church. You refer to the pastorate of Rev. J. D. Spidell. For years the Baptist congregation in Kentville has been large, and has been ministered to by preachers of marked ability. It was not always so. When I was a student at Wolfville I was one of a group of four young men who were engaged to take charge of the Sunday evening services each of us preaching once a month, the morning services being provided for without our assistance. The fee which I received, if my memory serves me, was two dollars, except once when, for a reason I do not remember—perhaps I preached worse than usual that night—I received one dollar and sixty-five cents. I was required to pay my horse-hire out of my fee. I remember a meeting held at a yet earlier date, when the Baptist Church of Kentville was beginning to hope for a separate and enterprising life of its own. The group that gathered that day, though hopeful was very small. The adherents of this church may well rejoice in the great progress made by the Church since those former days of small things. One of the pastors whose services were fruitful in Kentville has won a strong place in the Baptist ministry of Massachusetts. Another, a pastor for a shorter period, has attained eminence in the South. These men are Dr. Charles Day of Watertown, Mass., and Dr. Henry A. Porter of Atlanta, Ga. Because of the strong work done by Mr. Spidell during his pastorate, I am sure that both church and town must greatly regret his departure.

The other thing in the Advertiser which made me reminiscent was a reference to myself. The writer's kindly words were appreciated but when he referred to my birthplace his eyes halted at the glen when they should have travelled to the mountain top. I was not born in Highbury. I claim Canaan as my birthplace.

"Canaan's fair and happy land Where my possessions lie." Consisting now, after all the wear and tear of the years, of twelve acres of field, swamp and bush, just enough to prevent me from singing John Wesley's favorite, "No foot of land do I possess."

This, however, it not what I started out to write. I was about to tell of Highbury's ancient name, and the origin of it, as related to me, in my boyhood, by my grandfather. The glen lying halfway between New Minas and Canaan was for a long time a kind of no-man's-land, so far as a distinctive name was concerned. And in those days a flock of geese strayed into a neighbor's patch, and there did sufficient damage to put the neighbor into a rage. In his wrath he threw many stones at those marauding fowls, scaring them much, and worse than that, breaking the legs of not a few of them. The owner of the geese, as was to be expected, was furiously indignant, and the kindly neighbors of these two ancient men disappeared, and there was war between them many days. And this was the talk, and the cause of it the jest, of the countryside. At this time my grandfather had occasion to write a letter to a neighbor of the men who were enemies because of geese, and he addressed the good man as a resident of "Crippled Goose Valley." This was the name which I used to hear applied to what is now Highbury when I was a small boy. Had I been born in that charming spot, halfway from the Valley to the top of the mountain, my native place would not have been Highbury, but Crippled Goose Valley.

As a matter of fact I was born in Canaan, as was my mother

before me, and, like my mother, I have always loved the Canaan hills.

### Maybe They Need Work

"My horses are trying to eat the barn," says a farmer. "They gnaw at it and eat big holes in the mangers. I was advised to feed soda in the grain, but it seems to do no good. I feed good clean timothy and oats twice a day and corn at night with carrots and salt once a week."

We don't think there is anything in the soda idea. We have two guesses. One is, that the horses are wormy and the other is that they need exercise. Maybe both guesses are right.

Get a pound of strong smoking tobacco and mix with some bran or other chopped feed as much tobacco as you can get the horse to eat. Let them miss a meal or two before you give them this feed. Afterwards watch for evidence of intestinal worms. Repeat the dose in a week or so.

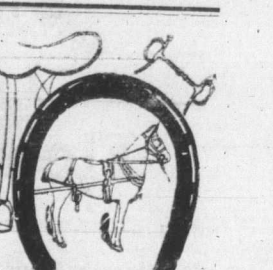

### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

Settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months out of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The act of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
