6 MEN BADLY INJURED LIAOYANG COST 33,500

By the Bursting of a Roller Mill Boiler.

-Part of the Building Wrecked and Hurled in Ali Directions-Beiler Was Lifted From Its Bed and Large Iron Smokestack Fell-Names of the

Toronto, Sept. 15.—About 1.45 yesterday afternoon one of the tubular boilers in the engine room of the McDonnell rolling mill at Sunnyside exploded with terrible force, badly injuring six of the workmen. Part of the building was wrecked and hurled in all directions, the boiler lifted from its bed and a large metal smokestack fell in. Fortunately the building being of epen construction the force of the explosion was confined to the part of the building near the boilers, and the men, about 70 in number, in the other part of the mill escaped. For those at work near the boilers there was no chance of Toronto, Sept. 15 .- About 1.45 the boilers there was no chance of escape, and they were carried out with the wreck of the roof and boil-

Six were found badly injured, two more severely than the others. The police and ambulances were quickly on the scene, and Doctors Hart, Lynd, Griffiths and Hunter did what they could for the men, who were conveyed to the Western Hospital.

Would Not Go As Second in Command on Sailing Vossel Arctic.

Captain Bernier revolted against these regulations when he was officially notified of the matter, and immediately threatened to resign, saying he was not going to play second fiddle to any man. He later carried his threat into execution, and telegraphied his resignation to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. The general impression is that Captain Bernier's resignation will be accented. Losses of Battle As Reported Officially By Russ and Jap.

Two Reports to the Emperor From Gen. tary Forces at Port Arthur-Kuropat kin Makes a Report Which Relieved Tension Felt at St. Petersburg-Blames Orleff For Failure.

London, Sept. 15.—Field Marshal Oyama reports to Tokio that a considerable Russian force remains considerable Russian force remains south of the Hun River, while Gen. Kuropatkin telegraphed to St. Petersburg that the bulk of the Japanese force is still south of the Yentai branch railroad. Oyama also says that the Russians are fortifying the heights or both sides of the Liso. River at Tie Pass. No light is thrown on the all-absorbing question of where the next engagement in force will occur.

Gen. Kuropatkin's estimate of his losses in the fighting around Liao-yang are far under the first reports. He reports that, from Aug. 28 to Sept. 5, he lost 4,000 killed and 12,-000 weunded. Marshal Oyama plac-ed the total of Japanese casuatties ed the total of Japanese casuatties at 17,500, making the total for both armies in round number 33,500. Accepting these figures as correct, the battle of Liaoyang, in killed and wounded, falls much lower in the scale of the worlds' great battles. Japanese Attacks Repulsed.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 15.—The Emperor has received the following despatch from Gen. Stoessel (commander of the Russian military forces at Port Arthur), dated Aug. 28: "I am happy to report to Your Majesty that at 8 o'clock in the morning of Aug. 27, during a violent rain and thunder storm, the Japanese again attempted to capture our left flank positions, near number one fort and Udan Mountain. Their attack was everywhere repulsed. Our losses were appelled three men killed and two of der of the Russian military forces at sverywhere repuised. Our losses were small—three men killed and two of-ficers and 98 men wounded. The wounded were brought in and are being carefully tended. A number of Japanese corpses would have been picked up by us, but the enemy pre-vented us from so doing by opening fire on the hospital attendants, who had been sent out under the Red Cross flag.

Japs Blewn Into the Air.

Another despatch from Gen. Stoessel to the Emperor, dated Sept. 2, says: "On the night of Sept. 1 the enemy attacked Visokaya and Mnnaenemy attacked Visokaya and Minna-ya Mountains and the neighboring fortifications, opening simultaneously an artillery fire on the forts and mountains. The leading files of the enemy, with the Japanese columns following them, were discovered in good time, and our batteries opened on them. The leading files fortunate-ly encountered some automatic mines, and many of the enemy were blown and many of the enemy were blown in the air. The attack was repulsed in an hour. Our losses were incon-siderable—one officer and seven men wounded."

Ignores British Pretest. London, Sept. 15.—The Globe yesterday afternoon says that the decision of the Vladivostock prize court to confiscate that portion of the cargo of the British steamer Calchas consisting of flour, cotton and timber, consigned to Japan, if confirmed by the Russian supreme court, amounts to a complete ignoring of amounts to a complete ignoring of the protest lodged by Great Britain at St. Petersburg against the in-clusion of provisions in the Russian list of contraband of war.

Kurepatkin's Report. St. Petersburg, Sept. 15.—Gen. Kuropatkin's official report, which was given out last night, comes as a considerable relief as setting at rest alarmist stories of the loss of guns, the cutting of divisions and the death are centure of prominent commandof prominent which have been freely circulat ers, which have been freely chicking here. The report bears out the declaration of the Associated Press at the time that Gen. Orloff's failure to hold the vital position at the Yentai mines was responsible for the breaking down of the whole of Gen. Kuropatkin's plan of battle and turned a potential victory into de-feat. The report, as given out, does not state the casualties, but the Associated Press is authoritatively in-formed that they were under 17,-
