The Nova Scotia School of Horticulture will reopen on Monday, Jan. 7th, 1895, with a four months course in horticulture especially adapted to young farmers and farmers' sons who can attend during the winter months. The lectures during the course are of such a nature as can be fully understood. No examinations required for admission. The instruction will cover such subjects as: for, matric of soils--their treatment, orchard, vegetable gardening, nursery work, diseases of plants and their remedy, in various insects and their treatment. The modern facilities in Green House, Root Cellar and Plant House afford means for practical work in grafting, budding, pruning, scioning, cutting, etc., carrying on all kinds of work connected with horticulture on the farm. Students are asked to bring with them any problems along the line of horticulture, specimens of diseases, insects, soil, etc., for study in laboratory with microscope, chemicals, etc. It is hoped that the young men of the Province will avail themselves of this opportunity and attend. To the Editor of the ACADIAN

Ma Editor.--I understand that the proprietors of the Kentville Advertiser are now making desperate efforts to force their branch sheet, the Orchardist, upon the people of Wolfville. It is probable that the Orchardist will drag out its wretched existence for a little and then "give up the ghost." It may in the meantime, however, if permitted, do some harm to our established newspaper, and its entire fate rests with the people of Wolfville. There is not enough room in our town for two prosperous newspapers. One of the two must go to the wall. Wolfville citizens must decide which shall exist, the Orchardist, an interloper and the fruit of an outside enterprise, or the ACADIAN, our established newspaper.

I deem it my duty at this time to remind the people of Wolfville of their indebtedness to the ACADIAN and the work which the ACADIAN has done for our town.

At a time when the town was too small for a Wolfville paper to be published with any degree of profit, when the luxury of a local paper seemed a thing of the remote future, the ACADIAN was started and Wolfville was raised to the dignity of a newspaper town. Through the columns of the ACADIAN the advantages of the town as a dwelling place and a tourists' resort have been sounded forth, and as a result Wolfville has grown rapidly and is yearly becoming more popular as a resort for tourists. By means of the ACADIAN our mercantile men have been enabled to advertise their wares and the purchaser has been informed where certain articles may be procured. Through it the citizen has been kept acquainted with the events, great and small, which have transpired around him. Parents each week have been enabled to send to their sons and daughters in distant lands a newsy letter from home. The ACADIAN has exercised a mighty influence in the development of our town. Scarcely a successful undertaking or a desired reform has been wrought which has not received its origin from the ACADIAN. It has ever kept before the minds of Wolfvillians their obligation to their town, and the appearance of Wolfville to-day shows the result.
