New Course for Ocean Steamers.
The Titanic's fate has already re-
sulted in prompt action by the Trans-
Atlantic lines to insure liners hereaf-
ter taking a course far to the south
of the iceberg danger will no
longer be present. The various lines,
it is announced, have agreed on a
new 'long' course, which dips far to
the south of the course upon which
the Titanic met disaster.
There is little disposition to criti-
cize Captain Smith for following the
course to which he was directed by
the naval hydrographers, in
steering a course well to the south
of the regular southern line. The north-
ern course used by vessels from July
to January, crosses the Grand Banks
in Latitude 45 north, four degrees fur-
ther up the map than the southern or
'long course,' in which the Titanic
met its fate.
As a matter of fact, the Titanic was
sixty miles south of the regular
southern course and was even in dan-
ger of collision with east bound
steamers, which are entitled to right
of way there by the rules of the sea.
The new route east bound provides
that steamships shall dip to Latitude
38-20 on the first third of their course,
making a total distance from New
York to Fastnet of 3,050 miles, where
as the distance is now reckoned a
2,825 miles. Liners will thus be car-
ried 270 miles below the route hereto-
fore followed. The loss of time or
the new course will be about nine
hours for a 24 knot boat. Boats of
the Olympic class may be eleven or
fourteen hours longer in crossing.

How Long Animals Live.
[Our Dumb Animals.]
Undoubtedly the longest-lived ani-
mal on earth is the whale, its span of
existence being estimated by Cuvier
at 1,000 years. The next largest
animal, the elephant, will, under fav-
orable conditions, live 400 years.
When Alexander the Great con-
quered Porus, King of India, he took
a great elephant that had fought gall-
antly for the defeated King, named
him Ajax, dedicated him to the sun,
and upon him a metal band with the
inscription, 'Alexander, the son of
Jupiter, dedicated Ajax to the sun.'
The elephant was found alive 350
years later.
The average age of cats is 15 years;
of squirrels, 7 or 8 years; of rabbits 7;
a bear rarely exceeds 20 years; a wolf,
20, a fox, 14 to 16. Lions are con-
sidered long-lived, instances have
been recorded where they reach the
age of 70 years.
Pigs have been known to live to
the age of 20 years and horses to 60,
but the average age of the horse is 25
to 30. Camels sometimes live to the
age of 100 and stags are very long
lived, one having been taken by
Charles VI in the forest of Seville
which bore about its neck a collar on
which was engraved, 'Cesar hoc milibus
dominis.'
Whether or not this stag had ac-
tually lived since the days of one of
the Caesars it is impossible to say,
but the evidence seems good.
Eagles occasionally and ravens fre-
quently reach the age of 100 years
and swans have been known to live
300 years. A tortoise has been
known to live 107 years.

Some time ago the United States
Bureau of Soils announced that grow-
ing grass is injurious to fruit-trees. A
long series of experiments at the Wo-
bura Experimental Fruit Farm in
England confirms this view. The
experiments show that grassing the
ground after the trees have been
planted arrests growth and perma-
nently stunts the trees. The effect is
particularly marked in the case of ap-
ple-trees. It is believed that grass
roots excrete some substance that is
poisonous to the tree roots. Perforat-
ed trays of sand containing growing
grass were placed on the surface of
the soil in which trees were growing,
so that the washings from the grass
eventually reached the tree roots.
The effect was found to be quite as
injurious as when grass was grown
above the roots of the tree in the or-
dinary way. The injury to the trees
cannot, therefore, be attributed to the
extraction of moisture of food supply
from the soil by the grass roots. The
washings from the trays were found
to lose their poisonous effect after be-
ing exposed to the air for a short
time.
