GRANTING PERMITS TO KILL SEALS OFF SOUTH COAST OF VICTORIA

Melbourne, Nov. 23.—The Game and Fisheries Department is now granting permits for the killing of seals off the South coast of Victoria. The seals there have multiplied to a very great extent in recent years owing to the protection afforded them by the Government, within the past few months there have been complaints from fishermen that the seals had become so numerous that they are destroying fish and damaging nets. As a result the Government began the issuing of permits. These are being granted preferably to returned soldiers or to persons who are willing to kill up to 1,000 head, on payment of a small royalty to the Department.

NO NEW ARRANGEMENTS FOR SUBSIDIZED NEWS FROM GREAT BRITAIN

London, Nov. 23.—Percy Hurd, in the House of Commons Monday, asked whether any fresh arrangements were being contemplated with Reuters Agency for the continued transmission of subsidized news to Canada and other parts of the Empire, and, if so, what is the character of the news to be subsidized, the amount of public money involved, what contributions would be made by the other governments of the Empire and the terms of the arrangement.

Col. Amery, Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, in reply, said the only new service at present in operation to which the Government contributed, is one to the Union of South Africa, the colonies and protectorates in East Africa, Malaya and Hong Kong, which had been approved up to December.

The cost approximately is, two-thirds paid by the Overseas Governments and one-third by the Imperial Government. The news sent relates to events of public importance, which in ordinary circumstances were not sent or sent only in a condensed form.

In regard to Canada, the Government would be glad to see the news service from the United Kingdom improved. There is reason to think that the Canadian Government take a similar view. Various discussions have taken place, but no arrangements have been arrived at.

CHILD BURNED WHEN LAMP IS UPSET IN A CANORA HOME

Canora, Sask., Nov. 23.—The 3-year-old child of George Wasly, who was burned when it upset a lamp in the living-room of its father's store on Railway avenue, at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, died Sunday morning.

Willis-helpers moved much of the stock out of the store. Condemnation of the fire system was freely expressed by onlookers; quite a long time was lost in getting the pressure working, and then it would only throw a stream of fire. The building was saved. There was no insurance on the stock. The loss is estimated at \$5,500.

WOMAN ADMITS THEFT AND THAT SHE SCRATCHED HERSELF AS A BLIND

Toronto, Nov. 23.—Alice Barber, night telephone operator, and office woman at drug hospital here, raised a commotion by calling for assistance. First arrivals found her with her face scratched and clothes torn, lying bound by a rope. The office desk was open, the contents scattered about and money missing. After investigation the police arrested the girl on a charge of stealing \$209.

She later confessed she had tied herself up, and even scratched her face, pinching pieces of flesh out to draw blood. She gave the police a signed confession. When she appeared in the woman's court Monday morning charged with the theft of \$209, she was remanded until Thursday.

FATAL FIGHT STARTS AT ITALIAN COUNCIL MEETING

Bologna, Italy, Nov. 22.—Seven persons were killed and thirty wounded in a conflict between the Socialists and Anti-Socialists at the first meeting of the new municipal council yesterday.

ONTARIO RETAIL MERCHANTS WANT ABOLITION OF TAX

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 18.—Strongly criticizing the Federal Government for refusing to repeal the Luxury Tax and compelling retail merchants throughout the country to act as tax collectors, three hundred delegates to the annual convention of the Ontario branch of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, which opened here yesterday, decided to make further representation to the Government urging the repeal of the Luxury Tax and the constitution of a tax applied at the source of production.

HANDSOME SET OF SHAKESPEARE PRESENTED TO COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE

As part of their educational work and in order to promote a further interest in Empire history, the Brandon Chapter Imperial Order Daughters of Empire have presented, for competition purposes, to the Brandon Collegiate Institute, a handsome set of Shakespeare, consisting of nine volumes bound in leather. This set will be competed for by the students of grade eleven and twelve. Essays of seven hundred words in length on various Imperial subjects will be written by the students, and the writer of the best essay will obtain the set of Shakespeare. The award will be made at Christmas.

NO REPLY RECEIVED TO CABLES TO RELATIVES

During the illness of the late Mr. Henry J. Rossiter, D.C.M., M.M., the Brandon Red Cross Society did all they could to help him. On Monday afternoon the executive of the society attended the funeral service in St. George's church.

The late Mr. Rossiter served for three years and seven months on the Saloniki front as a Sergeant and was decorated for his distinguished services. Since his death many cables have been sent to his relatives in England but as yet no reply has been received.

FIRE AT KENORA

Kenora, Ont., Nov. 22.—The Kenora municipal offices and telephone exchange were badly damaged by fire Sunday morning. The loss on the switchboard and other equipment being estimated at \$10,000, and on the building \$4,000, covered by insurance. The fire started in the ceiling of the basement near the chimney, which is thought to have been defective. The fire brigade did good work in confining the fire to the basement and first floor, but the offices are a sad wreck. The municipal telephone system will be out of commission until another switchboard is installed.

ADMISSION TO LEAGUE SOUGHT BY 14 NATIONS

Question of Responsibilities of League of Nations is a Big One

INTERFERENCE DANGEROUS

Rowell Declares There Must Be No Interference in Interior Affairs

Geneva, Nov. 22.—The responsibilities of the League of Nations and the responsibilities of its individual members under Article X of the covenant is one question the committee on admission of new members is considering in connection with the applications of fourteen states, not including Germany. These applications are now in the hands of sub-committees. They are:

Finland, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania and Luxembourg referred to sub-committee presided over by M. Poullet; Austria, Bulgaria, Albania and Lichtenstein, referred to sub-committee presided over by Lord Robert Cecil; and Georgia, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Ukraine, and Costa Rica, sub-committee presided over by Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, Norway.

Besides responsibilities under article X, the committees will consider in respect to each applicant the following questions:

Is its application in order? Is the government applying recognized de jure de facto, and by which states? Has the applicant nation a stable government and settled frontiers? What is its size and population? Is it self-governing? What has been its conduct, including both acts and assurances, with regard to its international obligations?

The latter question is supposed to have been inspired by the French member of the committee, M. Viviani, with a view to any proposition that may be submitted to elect Germany.

The prescriptions of the league as to armaments will also be considered in connection with the military power of each applicant.

In the opinion of the delegations, the first week's work of the assembly has been satisfactorily accomplished. Final concrete solutions are not expected on all questions because most of the important problems are complicated by the absence of the United States, Russia and the Central European powers. It is hoped, however, that fundamental plans will be laid to control armaments, organize an international court of justice, and put in force the blockade against any power breaking the covenant.

Says Interference is Dangerous

Geneva, Nov. 22.—Hon. N. W. Rowell, formerly President of the Privy Council, pointed out to the Assembly of the League of Nations Saturday the danger involved in any attempt to interfere with the interior affairs of any country. Canada, he said, would never consent to any such interference.

Mr. Rowell's remarks were made in discussion of the report of the Council to the Assembly, ending the first

stage of the Assembly's work. He was referring to the demand that had been made by Senator la Fontaine, of Belgium, that raw materials, wherever found, be made available for the use of all nations. The question of raw materials Mr. Rowell held to be a question of interior affairs.

Says League Wasting Time

Rowell criticized the League Council, declaring it had wasted time with "secondary problems." He demanded immediate settlement of the territorial dispute between Poland and Lithuania.

"The Council is an trial before the world," he said. "The typists report is a humiliating confession of failure. If the members of the Council cannot make pledges for their own nations, they had better resign and give way to others."

Rowell concluded with a warning that unless the Council is backed up by a few "well done actions" it will cease to hold the respect of the world.

COMMITTEE NAMED TO CONFER WITH EXECUTIVE CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY

A well-attended meeting of those interested in Children's Aid Society work, held in the Council Chamber of the City Hall, Saturday afternoon, a committee was appointed to confer with the executive of the Brandon Children's Aid Society regarding plans for further co-operation with the Children's Aid Society of Winnipeg. Those appointed on the committee included Rev. J. George Miller, convenor; Mrs. S. E. Clement, Miss S. E. Deaubier, Nurse McLeod, Rev. E. A. Anderson, Magistrate A. C. Fraser and Adjutant Tuttle.

Mr. Alfred White was appointed chairman of the meeting on Saturday and Mr. Andrew Murdoch, Provincial Organizer of the Children's Aid Society of Winnipeg, in a short address explained the work of the Association. He made a strong plea for greater co-operation from Brandon, both in the interest taken in the Society and also in financial assistance.

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BROTHER-IN-LAW OF PRESIDENT WILSON TO APPEAR AS WITNESS

New York, Nov. 23.—R. W. Bolling, treasurer of the Emergency Fleet Corporation and brother-in-law of President Wilson, named in connection with an alleged bribe involving ship-building contracts, is expected to appear voluntarily as a witness shortly after the Congressional Committee resumes its investigation of United States Shipping Board operations, Friday.

Bolling has characterized as "a lie" the report that he accepted \$1,800 as a "loan" from a representative of the Downey Shipbuilding Corporation.
