

DOES NOT BELONG TO NEWCASTLE.

Young Man Arrested in Portland
Says he Belongs
Here.

Portland, Me., Argus: It is thought that the man who made the break at Gould's clothing store at Freeport about three ago has been at last rounded up and the officials certainly have good reason for their belief, as the man, who gives his name as McLellan, was "ragged" out from top to bottom in articles of wearing apparel which a clerk from the store identified as belonging to Mr. Gould's stock. Deputy Leonard, of Brunswick, made the arrest on Monday. The deputy was on a car on Middle street when he saw McLellan on the sidewalk. He recognized him as the same man he had seen in Brunswick a few weeks ago and decided to investigate the matter. Jumping off the car he took the man to the station under arrest. McLellan denied absolutely that he was in no way connected with the break, but he was detained at the station until one of Mr. Gould's clerks was able to reach the station to look the outfit over. The clerk identified hat, coat, vest, stocking and shoe as once belonging to the stock of his employer's store. The man is one-legged and the shoe he was wearing was the mate to the one left in the store at the time the break was made. When questioned at the police station the man gave his name as George McLellan, 24 years old, and claimed that he belonged to Newcastle, N. B. He is a shoemaker by trade.

The Advocate, upon enquiry can learn of no one answering the above description who either lived or worked here recently. The arrested young man has evidently done as many another; given New Brunswick as his native country, when no doubt he is a Yankee. Across the border all the "bad" people come from New Brunswick, if you believe their story.

GREAT ACTOR DIES SUDDENLY.

Sir Henry Irving Passed Away
Suddenly Friday
Night.

REMARKABLE CAREER.

London, Oct. 14.—The English speaking world has suffered an irreparable loss by the sudden death of Sir Henry Irving last night, who was so universally regarded as the most representative English actor of contemporary times.

Sir Henry died literally in harness. He was giving a series of farewell performances in the English provinces and this week was playing an engagement at Bradford, appeared in several favourite roles. Thursday he presented "King René's Daughter," and "The Bulls," and appeared to be in excellent health, taking the exhausting part of Matthias in the latter play with all the vigor of youth. Last night before an enthusiastic audience he portrayed one of his most characteristically intellectual parts, the title role in his own stage adaptation of Lord Tennyson's "Becket" with marked success.

After the performance, Sir Henry returned to his hotel, reaching his rooms at 11.30 o'clock when it was observed that he was in great pain.

Physicians were immediately summoned, but before they could arrive Sir Henry was seized by an attack of syncope and expired within a few minutes.

GOOD RESULTS AT REDUCTION WORKS.

Dog-Fish Plant at Shippegan Running Full Time—Good Fertilizer.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—The department of marine and fisheries was advised today that the dog fish reduction works at Shippegan, Gloucester county, started up this week with a plentiful supply of dogfish to keep the plant running full time. The first establishment of the kind was opened at Canoe two weeks ago, and at this point the reduction plant is grinding from five to ten tons of dogfish in an hour. So numerous are dogfish on this portion of the Nova Scotia coast that one day last week two schooners landed thousands of fish, taxing the plant to be ascertained whether the oil secured by the reduction process can be made a marketable commodity, but there is thought to be no question as to the success of marketing the fertilizer prepared from the ground carcases of the fish.

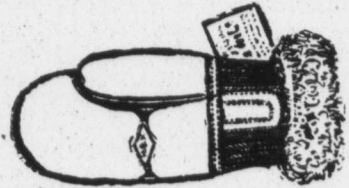
