LOCAL ELECTIONS
The executive of the Liberal party met at the Hotel de Ville and as a result a call has been issued for a Liberal convention at Berryman's Hall to-morrow Tuesday evening to select a candidate for the seat in the legislature made vacant by the retirement of Hon H. A. McKeown.

Liberal electors of the county of St John are called to meet this evening in Temperance Hall Fairville, to select a candidate for the county seat vacant through the appointment to the collectorship of customs of Hon A. S. Dunn.

The report on the streets to-day is that these two elections will be brought on together about the end of the month—in fact Friday December 30, is spoken of as the probable election day.

For some time past it has been pretty certain that Coun James Lowell would be the government candidate in the county. In fact, the only other names mentioned have been Mr. F. W. Barnhill and Col H. H. McLean. Both of these have announced that they are not in the field, so Coun Lowell, who will be a very strong candidate, is almost sure of an unanimous nomination. He will be opposed by Mr. M. E. Agar, who has been in the field for some time.

For the city seat the report is that Mr A O Skinner will be chosen, and that if nominated he will run. The opposition would not be yet selected a candidate for this seat, and it is not known who will be the choice.

THE DOMINION FISH CO.

Mr. R. H. M. Gilker, manager of the Dominion Fish Co's branch at Loggieville, shipped the first car of smelts yesterday. This is the Company's first season in the fish business on the Miramichi. The rivalry between the buyers is great and the fishermen already feel the benefit of the competition. The price of smelts is kept up and the new company can take the credit of running the price of tomcods to the highest point ever reached on the Miramichi. At this date in former years tomcods could be bought for 25 cents to 40 cents per barrel, but today the fish fetch \$1.25 per barrel. The Company has already shipped several carloads of tomcods from Chatham and Newcastle. A freezer and packing shed, 100x30 ft., has just been completed at Loggieville, and the Company also has a freezer at Richibucto and Dalhousie.

C. P. Telegraphers Demand Ten Per Cent Increase And Refuse Arbitration

Montreal, Dec 8—There is no immediate prospect of a strike by the Canadian Pacific Railway telegraphers, who are demanding a ten per cent. increase and refuse to arbitrate. Negotiations between a committee, representing the men on the system and the company have been resumed and may extend until Christmas.

President Penham, of the International Order, who is here advising the C. P. R. committee, says the men are in a position to strike if such action is necessary to enforce demands.

Officials of the Canadian Pacific decline to make any statement concerning the demands.

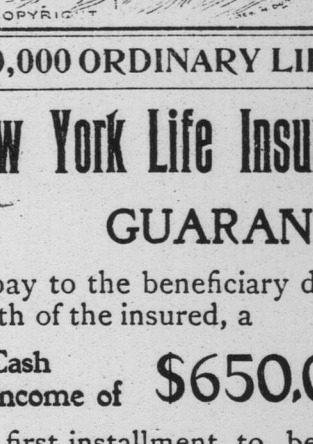
