Cabinet Has Chosen June 8th as the Quebec, May 5.—At a meeting of the Quebec Provincial Cabinet, held this forenoon, and presided over by Premier Gouin, it was decided to dissolve the House and hold the general elections on Manday, June 8, the same date on which the Ontario Provincial elections are scheduled to take place. Winnipeg. Winnipeg. May 5.—Murdock McLennan, the only known survivor of the party sent out in 1853, under Dr. Rae, to search for Sir John Franklin, spent yesterday here with his granddaughter. He is still hale and hearty at 82 years of age, and can relate graphically matters of interest connected with that terrible trip into the Arctic. He says that half has never been told of the remarkable mineral wealth of that region, where gold, coal, copper and silver abound. He also tells of an island of purest marble along the northwestern shore of Hudson's Bay and declares the harbor at Churheill to be one of the finest in the world.

DROWNED BY HER HORSE.

Annie Boyd, of Indian Head, Sask., Thrown Into Water.

Indian Head, Sask., May 5. — Miss Annie Boyd, daughter of John Boyd, of this place, was drowned yesterday afternoon in the Sunbeam dam. Miss Boyd was found of horses and was out driving a colt. On her return, while crossing the high roadway which forms the barrier of the big Sunbeam dam, the horse became fractions, and getting beyond control, plunged down the bank into the water, which is twenty feet deep, dragging with him Miss Boyd, who was caught in the wheels, Miss Boyd was an only child and a general favorite in this community, where she was born and her whole life had been spent.

less Investments. Washington, May 5.—John Norris of New York, the representative of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association, to-day repeated his statement before the House Committee inment before the House Committee investigating the wood pulp and print paper industry that the American paper manufacturers have bought large tracts of woodlands in Canada, and charged that instead of cutting the timber on this land, which they have bought with almost recklessness, they have gone into the market and artificially marked up the prices on themselves. He protested that the American consumers should not be saddled with the penalties of any such speculation. Mr. Norris produced figures to show that there has been a reduction in the price of pulpwood exported

"These men," he said, "are simply drunk with speculation, and I expect to show that they have been investing in Canada from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 in the acquirement of timber lands apparently upon the idea of a good speculation in timber instead of applying their moneys to the extension of the manufacture of paper in the United States to meet the demart. phia Doctor.

Philadelphia, May 5.—That the picking of buttercups is injurious to the health of children is the theory of Dr. W. W. Chalfonte, of 1,435 North Sixteenth street. He declared to-day at a meeting of physicians that some cases called measles are not measles at all, but are the effects of gathering buttercups and inhaling their perfume.

"Buttercup fever" is the term Dr. Chalfonte gives the disease. "In Germany and Holland there are laws forbidding the growing and picking of buttercups," said the physician. "Land-owners are cautioned and dairy inspectors are assigned to see the pastures are free of the flowers. In these countries epidemics of buttercup fever' came regularly, and in some cases the disease proved fatal." phia Doctor.
