The readers of this journal are hereby informed, that **Fredericton is the Capital of New Brunswick**, and that York Point, and Marsh Bridge, and Reed's Castle, and MacEvoy's, and the old Bell Tower, and Partridge Island, all remain just as they were!

A St. JOHN paper to-day, the **News**, under the caption Cabinet Changes says—
There is talk of Mr. Chapleau shortly succeeding Mr. Mason in the Privy Council, of Mr. Caron succeeding Mr. Baby to be appointed a judge, of Sir John taking the Presidency of the Council, and of Mr. Daly or Mr. Costigan succeeding Mr. O'Connor, likely to be appointed to the Chief Justice, ship of Manitoba.

The **News**, we regret to say, is not a very good authority on Ottawa matters. The story it publishes above is the old story renewed: but a good deal of it may turn out true. That a large portion of Canada look to Mr. Costigan as the coming Post Master General there is little doubt; how any one would think for a moment that there is any Cabinet honor in store for Mr. Daly is quite more than we are able to understand. Mr. Daly may be estimable in private life and social circles, but he has yet to earn his public laurels.

Cabinet offices are not usually conferred on men of theories, but on men of deeds. No, some man who has fought side by side with the Conservatives from first to last, who has borne with them the heat and burden of the day, will get that. Some man like Mr. John Costigan, say, who has stood by their side from the first; never turning back, and true to his party in the dark hours of the Pacific scandal as in their palmiest days. A very large number of the people of Canada know Mr. Costigan, and look up to him as a representative man; very few people outside of Halifax know Mr. Daly—both are Roman Catholics—and almost as few look to him as deserving of Cabinet honors. Mr. Costigan's rights cannot surely be much longer deferred.

As will be seen by our report, Mr. P. McPeake, our worthy fellow citizen, resigned his position as City Auditor Thursday evening. Mr. McPeake held the position for 11 years, always with credit to himself, and to the satisfaction of the public. It is a good deal for him to be able to say that in that time no one ever tried to supplant him. In a few days he enters upon a position which he so well deserves, and which is a just tribute to the high regard in which he is held by all classes of our community. We are glad to see the Council appointed Mr. J. F. McMurray in Mr. McPeake's place. The selection is an excellent one, and while there is not very much pay attached to the office there is a good deal of trust, and we therefore congratulate our friend Mr. McMurray.

The Attorney General and the Chief Commissioner joined the Surveyor General yesterday at Newcastle. The Government trio then started for Tracadie to surrender the Lazaretto management, and the lepers, into the hands of the Agricultural Department, Ottawa. The Local Government is to be congratulated for getting this matter off our hands; the Dominion Government is to be thanked for taking it off.

There are few in Canada who have not heard of Sandford Fleming. Almost simultaneous with the mention of railroads in this country his name was heard, and upon railroading he has been for a long time—for quite too long a time—looked up to as an oracle. His railroad theories are of the antiquated order, and he is insufferably extravagant. He never cared how much a road might cost provided he could get it built according to his own ideas. Both Canadian parties reposed a great deal of confidence in him, and either was loth to dismiss him, even when newer, and cheaper, and better modes of railroading were being adopted all around us. But the time came when even Fleming had to go. He was first removed from the Chief Engineership, and appointed Consulting Engineer. He declined this; and then as was quite natural began to abuse the Government, ostensibly for wrong doing in public matters, in reality for doing what they should have done long ago, dismissing an extravagant and antiquated engineer.

We are rather of the opinion that it is much better to lead than to drive. Mayor Gregory should have allowed the dignity of his high-toned Council to suffer for once, and if he did nothing else, treat the petition of the firemen with common courtesy. He chose rather to join issue with the firemen, and so at the next fire we will have the beautiful spectacle of firemen turning out to do their duty against their will, and only spurred on by the good sticks of the law. It must occur to Mayor Gregory that there is many a way of choking a dog besides choking him with butter—and that acting within even his interpretation of the law as firemen, is one thing, but doing the duty of firemen according to the firemen's notion is quite another.

DR TANNER of New York has undertaken to fast for forty days and forty nights. The physicians say he will first go crazy and then die—the latter disaster overtaking him between the seventh and ninth days. Yet at latest accounts, and the Doctor had then fasted seven days, he was talkative as ever, and tossed about on his cot smart as a cricket. The lines began to deepen on his face, and his eyes looked pinched. Several visitors were with him yesterday. We would not recommend any one to visit the Dr. alone, because it is only natural now that he has far less horror of cannibalism than he had some time ago.

SENATOR O'DELL crept into town to-day to pay his taxes. He starts away in the morning a little after daylight. He will be back this time twelvemonth. Mr. O'Dell is Senator for this city.

A weekly publication in this city attacks Senator O'Dell pretty strongly on every occasion that arises. The reason is the proprietor of that paper—we now refer to Mr. Julius L. Inches—wishes himself to be made a Senator. We suppose, however, the Dominion Government are thoroughly in their senses.

THERE was a fire alarm this afternoon and no firemen to turn out. Policemen Roberts and Kingston pulled the engine out on the street, and then went out to ask the citizens to lend a hand. The alarm came from Kirby's corner, and was caused by chimney sparks. We are in a pretty stew surely—and all on account of the Mayor's solicitude for the dignity of the City Council.

BENNETT, the murderer of Hon. Geo. Brown, has made up his mind to die. When he was asked yesterday by his counsel to sign a petition asking a commutation of his sentence, he refused, saying he preferred death even on the scaffold to imprisonment for life. This is cowardice rather than courage.

The "Edward M. Patchell," spoken of in our New York telegram, as being connected with the robbery of bonds, was a clerk in the British North America Bank here a little over two years ago.

The dove brings the peace branch from Buenos Ayres. The instruction among that fiery people has been suppressed,—*pro tempore*.
