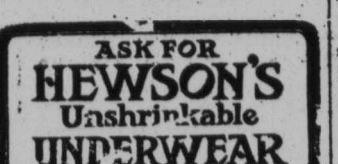

OBITUARY

GEORGE BELL

Word has been received by Mr. W. H. Bell, announcing the death of his brother George Bell, which occurred in Calgary, January 15, at the age of 64 years. The cause of death was stomach trouble. Mr. Bell's wife predeceased him five years ago and there are no children. One sister, Mrs. C. C. Bell, of San Francisco and two brothers, W. H. Bell, of Newcastle and E. P. Bell, of San Francisco, survive. Mr. Bell lived in Halifax up to two years ago when he removed to Calgary. The remains were interred at Pincher Creek, beside those of his brother.

J. HENRY COPP

The death of J. Henry Copp, of Port Elgin, occurred at that place Saturday night, Jan. 26, at the age of 74 years. He was critically ill one sister, Mrs. Davis, of Port Elgin; one daughter, wife of Rev. W. J. Dean, of Newcastle; one son, Courtney B. of Port Elgin. Mr. Copp was at one time engaged in the commission business in St. John and also in Sydney. For the past ten years he has been running a grocery store at Port Elgin, which business he disposed of on the day he was taken ill. He was nearly sixty-four years of age. Mr. Copp visited Newcastle recently, and was apparently in very good health.

HAZEN McTAVISH

The death of Hazen McTavish of Red Bank, who has been ill for some time with consumption, occurred Friday at the home of his sister, Mrs. Alex. MacDonald, of Black River. He was 33 years old, and leaves the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. John Russell, Greenville, Me.; Mrs. MacDonald, of Black River; William, of Little Southwest Miramichi; Weldon McTavish and Miss Sophie at home. Deceased was well and favorably known throughout the County having for several years been an agent for the Miramichi Farm Implement Company.

JOHN McLAGGAN

The death took place suddenly Saturday night in Chatham of John McLaggan at his residence, a mile above Chatham. He was seventy-two years of age, and death was due to heart failure. He had retired in apparently good health, but passed away during the night.

The late Mr. McLaggan was born in Blackville, son of the late Alexander McLaggan, and for many years was engaged in the lumbering business at that place, owning and operating with his brother Peter, the mill property now or lately belonging to the Gibson Company. Eventually they sold this out to Scott Fairley, who afterwards disposed of it to the Gibson Company.

Mr. McLaggan for a time resided and did business in Newcastle, but moved to Chatham and lately retired from active business life.

He was a man of retiring disposition but extremely well read and one of more than ordinary mental ability. Mr. McLaggan is survived by his wife, one brother, Peter, in Blackville, a sister, Mrs. Grace Coughlin, of Fredericton and four nephews, Chas. E., of New Glasgow; W. J., and Robt. of Blackville, and Wm. A. Park, of Newcastle.

The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock at Blackville.
