Admiral Fisher Dies Following Operation

London, July 10—Ai 1 val John A. Fisher, first Baron of Kilvenstone and former First Lord of the Admiralty, died this morning.

Lord Fisher underwent a serious operation yesterday and failed to

rally. Lord Fisher began his naval career in 1854, and while on active service took part in the Crimean, Chinesse and Egyptian wars. He became Lord of the Admiralty in 1892, and First Sea Lord of the Admiralty in 1904 which post he held for six years.

ober, 1914, to resume his post as First Sea Lord of the Admiralty and direct the naval warfare against Germany. His vigorous policy caused him to be termed "the Kitchener of the Navy" and chief credit has been claimed for him in the bottling up of the German navy. Cabinet disputes led to his resignation 4n May, 1915, but he continued to serve the Bri-tish Government in various capaciprominent naval critic.

He is survived by one son and hnee daughters.


Lord Fisher was for many years a popular idol in Great Britain. He was known as the "Father of the Dreadnought" because he was the first to realize the vast power of this type of warship. During his term as First Sea Lord of the Admiralty from 1904 to 1910, he virtually revolutionized the Navy. He entirely changed the old established and outworn stragegic disposition of the fleet, and threw no less than 150 warships from immense iron clads light cruisers into the scrap heap as bsolete and out-of-date.

Caused Great Sensation

Being a reformer by nature, Lord Fisher's attack on the British naval dministration in September, 1919, in which he denounced the expenditure being made as "ruinous" might have been expected, but it caused a great sensation throughout the British Em-

Later Lord Fisher declared that in the submarine he saw the future sea fighter, and that the development of aviation had made invasion of Great Britain impracticable. Lord Fisher mas been seriously fil early since in May, when he underwent an operation
