

## HOME NURSING RULES.

### How to Treat Pneumonia, Hemorrhages, Drowning, Indigestion Etc.

In a recent lecture in the course on "Home Nursing" Miss Thompson in the Homeopathic Hospital, Montreal, treated of pneumonia, hemorrhages, drowning, poisoning, fits, fainting and indigestion. Pneumonia need careful nursing; it is very prevalent in winter and is usually the result of a cold. It is dangerous, severe and generally lasts for three weeks.

### Could not Defeat the Liberal Candidates in Verchères.

Mgr. Moreau of St. Hyacinthe, took a hand in the election at Verchères, but his powerful influence did not defeat the Liberal candidate.

On Sunday, March 24th, having just read the remedial order, the Bishop sent the following letter to Hon. J. A. Ouimet, Minister of Public Works: "St. Hyacinthe, March 24.—Hon. J. A. Ouimet: Your Minister.—Permit me to express to you the keen satisfaction which I have experienced on reading the order in council which you and your colleagues have just passed in favor of the Catholics of Manitoba. It is precisely what I wanted for the first thing to do is to send to a doctor, but until he comes any one can do a good deal to arrest the hemorrhage. The patient should be laid flat on the bed, with the foot of the bed raised several inches; never give stimulants, cracked ice can be given to suck. Keep the patient as quiet as possible, do not excite him at all. Lay an ice bag or a cloth dipped in ice water across the chest. Do not give any nourishment for twelve hours after the hemorrhage, not even milk; for a week only give liquid diet and nothing hot. After he has begun giving solids, cut the crust off the bread.

Drowning—If you are trying alone to bring back to consciousness a person who has been nearly drowned, lay him flat on the ground, fold a coat or piece of cloth and lay it under him between his shoulders; tear a piece of cotton—a handkerchief—into strips, pull out his tongue as far as possible, wind a strip of the cotton around the tongue and tie the strip around the throat. If you have help, of course, it is easy to hold the tongue instead of tying it. Take hold of the arms between the elbow and the wrist, and raise them gently above the head, then lower to the side again, about sixteen times a minute; watch for a sign of recovery, then stop. If he is not breathing, but he has a pulse, give him a few mouthfuls of air, then lay him down again, and continue the same process.

In CASE OF POISONING  
it is very necessary to do something at once. Put the person to bed right off; if the poison taken is caustic acid, give two tablespoonfuls of olive oil to an adult, and one tablespoonful to a child; if there is no lime-water and milk; if there is no lime-water in the house, break a small piece of lime off outside wall, dissolve it in water, strain and add it to the milk. Instead of arsenic, give starch and flour, mixed together, and afterwards a teacup of hot water, with a teaspoonful of mustard in it. For iodine, give the mustard and water right off; after this has had effect, give the lime water and milk. After poison of any kind is very careful of the diet, give milk and soft boiled eggs, but nothing that will irritate. For fits lay the patient down on the floor or bed if possible, put something between the teeth, a small piece of cork or cotton; the feet are always very cold, try and put something hot to them and have lots of fresh air. For faint unbroken the clothing and open all the windows; if the faint is from a hemorrhage never give brandy as this will only increase it. Sprinkle the face with cold water and put the patient to bed as soon as he has recovered. In digestion is a very common thing now-a-days and one ought to be able to treat one's self. The first thing is not to eat food that will cause it; before eating late hours is also very bad. Never drink anything except water, but if you do, drink it slowly.
