MILDNESS OF THE SEASON.—The Rev William Stephen, Garvock Manse, Laurencekirk, writes:—"I came across the enclosed specimen of heather on the Hill of Garvock, at a height of 700 to 800 feet above sea level. You will observe that some of the blooms are in the process of formation. It was growing in quite an exposed place. I should think it a good evidence of the mildness of the season." Mr James Watt, gardener, Chapel Gardens, Kirkcaldy, has forwarded specimens of twenty-five varieties—including roses, stocks, chrysanthemums, wallflower, godetia, carnations, polyanthus, calcareolas, of spring and summer flowers, which are still in full bloom in the flower borders of Chapel Gardens, belonging to Mr W.
