**SHAMROCKS WALLTOP NATIONALS.**  
Montreal, Jan. 12.—Shamrocks, being extended, set a scoring record in the 1910 hockey season in the defeating the Nationals tonight goals to 8. Donald of Cornwall, makes a sixth man team, and Baker, the goalkeeper sole representative of the old Stanley Cup squad. On paper it is a team of class calibre and there was enough hockey to their play tonight to show that the team despite its defeat by Quebec here is going to be much more formidable rival to the Stanley Cup team than the Canadian Association.
