After a general discussion, in which it was pointed out that the city would save considerable money by adopting Mr. Owens' system over the system by the late Health Engineering Company, the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the system of sewage disposal as designed by Mr. Owens, provincial sanitary engineer, be forwarded to the Stony Plain board of trade showing them the unsatisfactory conditions for marketing hogs in the city.
