For several days past the Straits of Belle Isle have been packed with ice and no water is visible from the island. This year the ice has formed earlier than last year owing to the extremely frosty weather prevailing. Last year the weather was far milder and the ice did not form until late in the season nor did the Arctic ice appear until March. A good blow of heavy S. and S. PICKED UP BY WIRELESS.—Last Tuesday the S. S. Florizel picked up the Allan Lerner Sicilian which was on her way to Halifax from Liverpool. Yesterday she got in touch with the Empress of Ireland.

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Florizel's Record Run.

The s.s. Florizel, Capt. Clarke, arrived here at 5 p.m. yesterday, making the run from New York to this port in the record time of 4 days, and of course calling at Halifax. This is the quickest trip ever made over this route, and Capt. Clarke is to be congratulated on his record. Leaving New York Saturday afternoon she had excellent weather on the run to Halifax and came down to that port in 42 hours. She remained there taking freight for 12 hours, and left at midnight Monday for this port. The vessel had strong N. W. winds on the run down and she established a record on the route between Halifax and this port, getting here in 41 hours, though in November she made the run up to Halifax in 40 hours. The ship is in splendid steaming trim, as the Telegram recently remarked, and almost each trip sees her reducing the time in running to and from this port. She had a three-fourths cargo and her passengers were: From New York—Miss Shea, Mrs. E. Crawford, Mrs. E. R. Bowring, Mrs. (Dr.) Rendell, G. D. Scarborough, J. J. Sullivan, R. F. Harrison, J. Jackson, J. McFadden, J. C. Jones and 5 second class, while 2 second class came from Halifax.
