## Are We An Ignorant Lot?

Dear Sir,—It is generally stated the press educates and represents the minds of the masses—if so it would seem we are an ignorant lot—all of our papers last evening in having headlines and in police paragraphs blazoned the name of an highly estimable and entirely innocent lady who must have been deeply pained through so much publicity. Much sympathy is expressed for her—if a party unfortunately has a neighbor with fighting instincts unduly developed who unreasonably and unwarrantedly rushes them into law—when the Court decides their innocence, without even asking the accused on a single question—the accused being sent out of court after telling his own ridiculous story—then it is time for an educated press to minimize the worry caused the innocent instead of increasing it by flaring paragraphs.

A little advice here may be of benefit to the S. P. C. A. The Society is much needed here—Judge Johnston deserves credit for reviving it. However in instituting proceedings a committee should decide as to the eligibility of the case for prosecution and not leave this important part of the work to a young solicitor who is apparently fond of getting a case in court—and who in this instance was requested by members of the society to drop proceedings as there was no case, his argument being not the merit of the case but that as he had commenced proceedings some truckmen against whom he had proceeded might criticize him. This sort of procedure is well in line with Dr. Donnelly's testimony that he diagnosed the case not from examination of the animal or from what he knew but from what he was told by its owner. We are truly living in a scientific age with such proceedings as yesterday the society sinks below its purpose and weakens the respect it should merit.

## To-Day's News.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day. A three days battle and a Bulgarian turning movement have resulted, according to Sofia accounts, in the fall of Kirk Killiseh and the capture of the Turkish garrison, numbering fifty thousand men. That so many Turks have been taken is regarded as impossible and the more likely report is that the Turks retreated in the direction of Bunardissar. The capture of this stronghold, to which the Turks attacked almost the same importance as to Adrianople, is confirmed from Constantinople in an official communication, explaining the Turkish army at Kirk Killiseh is attempting to split the enemy's forces, discovered they were in greater strength than had been anticipated. The Turks retired to south to await reinforcements. The news of the Adrianople will soon follow. It is as is generally assumed, Abdulah Pasha is still engaged in bringing his main army to Adrianople, the position of that town is critical. An interesting situation will develop should Turks be compelled evacuate Adrianople. It is supposed the next stand of the Turks will be made at Demotica 25 miles south Adrianople, an important strategic position on road Constantinople.

Special Evening Telegram.

BELGRADE, To-day. Official announcement made here Serbian forces occupied Novipazar, Pristina, Kumanova, Kratovo and Katschana. Detachments of the Serbian army entered Kumanova this afternoon after annihilating the Turkish batteries. The fighting around the town lasted three days.

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## How It Occurred

Passengers who came along on the Glencoe and came in from Flacensis last night say that a mystery surrounds the burning of Mr. W. T. Burke's residence at St. Jacques. Monday night. The family were attending a concert and dance at the hall not far from their residence. At 10 o'clock the discovery that the house was on fire was made and the people of the place worked hard to quench it with water from wells near. The flames, however, had such headway that their efforts were in vain—in an hour the building was but a mass of ruins. Not an article of furniture was saved and a large amount of cash left in the house was also destroyed. Neither house, nor furniture were insured and the loss to the owner is a very serious one. As far as could be ascertained there was no fire left in the kitchen when the Burke people left their home.

## German Kaiser's War Chest.

It will be a surprise to many to learn that the German Kaiser has actually a war chest containing some \$60,000,000 in real money. But the news need not cause undue alarm. The huge fund which is kept in the Julius Tower at Spandau, represents the money reserved from the French indemnity payment. Having been withdrawn from circulation, as it were, the community loses interest on the huge sum of something like two million dollars a year.

Julius Tower forms the centre of the centre of the Citadel of Spandau, the most important fortification of Berlin. At the same time from the historical point of view it does not seem a particularly safe place to keep the treasure for repeatedly Spandau has fallen into the hands of an enemy. During the Seven Years' War it was captured by the Russians; and from October, 1806, until April 1813, the French held the fortress.

Julius Tower itself is constructed of solid blocks of basalt, and it is said that its foundations go down to a depth ten feet lower than the bed of the River Spree.

The Kaiser's war fund is reported by those who know to be kept in iron chests inscribed with the names and addresses of commanders of army corps and admirals of fleets. These packages would be immediately dispatched to the officers named in the event of war. Special sums have been set aside for commanders on the frontier in the vicinity of the outbreak of hostilities, and there are also set aside special sums to be used for special purposes, such as the secret service. For the most part this treasure consists of ten and twenty mark pieces; but there are supposed to be quantities of coins of all the great powers, principally France, Great Britain and Russia.

At stated times during the year all this treasure is opened, weighed and counted by army officers specially detailed by the Emperor from all parts of Germany. It is a feature of the count that prior thereto these officers must give their word of honour that they do not know one another. Furthermore, although the war funds are in charge of a special officer at the Tower, he is not always advised of the proceedings beforehand. In such event it is only when the Kaiser's special deputies have finished their task that this officer is called to check up the accounts.

The defence of the Tower is entrusted to the Fourth Grenadier Regiment and a battery of the Third Grenadiers. There is also stationed within the citadel the Third Train Battalion, which is ever ready to conduct the war treasure to the various destinations assigned it.

At irregular hours of the night the interior of the Tower is carefully searched for thieves. During this search the sentinels hold their arms ready to shoot any suspected person. At the very bottom of the Tower, on the water level, there is a guardroom, the inmates of which are detailed to prevent the possibility of robbers gaining entrance to the secret crypts by means of tunnels. Then there is a second guard-room behind the only entrance door. The purpose of this is to defend the entrance and staircase leading to the vaults.

Then, too, before each of the vaults sentinels are posted and others are constantly passing up and down the staircase. There is a third guardroom under the roof with lookouts in all directions.
