War Chest

It will be a surprise to many to learn that the German Kaiser has actually a war chest containing some \$60,000,000 in real money. But the news need fund which is kept in the Julius Tower at Spandu, represents the money eserved from the French indemnity payment. Having been withdrawn from circulation, as it were, the comnunity loses interest on the huge sum of something like two million iollars a year.

Julius Tower forms the centre of he centre of the Citadel of Spandu, he most important fortification of Berlin. At the same time from the nistorical point of view it does not seem a particularly safe place to keep the treasure for repeatedly Spandu has fallen into the hands of an enemy. During the Seven Years' War it was captured by the Russians; and from October, 1806, until April 1813, the rench held the fortress.

Julius Tower itself is constructed of solid blocks of basalt, and it is said hat its foundations go down to a lepth ten feet lower than the bed of he River Spree.

The Kaiser's war fund is reported by those who know to be kept in iron thests inscribed with the names and ddresses of commanders of army orps and admirals of fleets. These packages would be immediately depatched to the officers named in the vent of war. Special sums have been et aside for rontier in the vicinity of the outbrake of hostilities, and there are also et aside special sums to be used for pecial purposes, such as the secret ervice. For the most part this treaure consists of ten and twenty mark quantities of coins of all the great Powers, principally France, Great Britain and Russia.

At stated times during the year all his treasure is opened, weighed and ounted by army officers specially deailed by the Emperor from all parts of Germany. It is a feature of the count that prior thereto these officers nust give their word of honour that hey do not know one another. Furn charge of a special officer at the Fower, he is not always advised of the proceedings beforehand. In such event it is only when the Kaiser's special deputies have finished their task that this officer is called to check

p the accounts. The defence of the Tower is enrusted to the Fourth Grenadier Reginent and a battery of the Third Grenidiers. There is also stationed withn the citadel the Third Train Battalon, which is ever ready to conduct the war treasure to the various destinations assigned it.

At irregular hours of the night the nterior of the Tower is carefully searched for thieves. During this search the sentinels hold their arms ready to shoot any suspected person. At the very bottom of the Tower, on the water level, there is a guardroom, the inmates of which are derobbers gaining entrance to the se-

tailed to prevent the possibility of cret crypts by means of tunnels. Then there is a second guard-room behind the only entrance door. The purpose of this is to defend the entrance and staircase leading to the vaults.

Then, too, before each of the vaults sentinels are posted and others are constantly passing up and down the staircase. There is a third guardroom under the roof with lookouts in all directions.
