

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

DIED OF WOUNDS.

BELFAST, Jan. 30.
One of the members of the ambush party, which was surprised by military forces, Friday, at Coachford, County Cork, died in a hospital here to-day of wounds, received in the engagement.

AMBUSH CASUALTIES.

BELFAST, Jan. 30.
An officer and one man were seriously wounded, and five others slightly wounded, when a lorry in which they were riding was ambushed last night, in the vicinity of Tenure, a quiet residential district on the South side of Dublin.

NEVER SMOKE WITHOUT FIRE.

LONDON, Jan. 30.
Members of the Prime Minister's official family in Downing Street to-day, ridiculed reports that Mr. Lloyd George had warned the party whips to prepare for a general election in June.

CHEMIST SHOT DEAD.

LIMERICK, Jan. 30.
Thomas Blake, President of the Limerick Branch of the Chemists Association, was found dead to-day near his home. He had been shot.

KILLED WHILE MAKING ESCAPE.

DUBLIN, Jan. 30.
Frank Meara, a laborer, who had been arrested at Kiltfaule, Tipperary, was shot dead to-day, when he tried to escape.

ON REMITTED SENTENCE.

LONDON, Jan. 30.
Father Dominic, Chaplain of the Republican Guard, and Spiritual Adviser to the late Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, and convicted by a Dublin court martial early in January, has been sentenced to five years imprisonment, of which two years are remitted.

HELPLESS AND DRIFTING.

QUEENSTOWN, Jan. 30.
A wireless message, asking assistance was received here to-day from the British steamer St. Lawrence, which left Leith January 27, for New York. The steamer's propeller blades have been carried away and she is drifting North West of Scotland, off the Atlantic steamer route, the message says.

MILITARY WRECK SINN FEIN CLUB.

BELFAST, Jan. 30.
Cullinstown House in Ranelagh, a Dublin suburb, was wrecked Saturday by military. The house was owned by the aged mother of Patrick H. Pearse, once "Provisional President" of Ireland, who was executed after the 1916 rebellion. Previously it was used as a college. Later the building has been rented out as flats, and a portion of it was occupied by a Sinn Fein Club.

UNCOMPLIMENTARY.

LONDON, Jan. 31.
Allied repatriation terms decided upon by the Supreme Allied Council, in Paris last week, were described as "Folly" by the Manchester Guardian to-day. The newspaper said, "we may be thankful such terms can never be executed."

FIREMEN SUFFERED SEVERELY.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., Jan. 31.
Three firemen were killed, and eighteen injured when the wall of a building at 88 Mathewson Street collapsed in a fire, early this morning.

SEETHING WITH DISCONTENT.

LONDON, Jan. 31.
A cable from Johannesburg to the Canadian Associated Press says the civil service of South Africa is seething with discontent, owing to delay in rectifying the scale of pay, and many younger officials are reported strongly in favor of direct action.

KANAKA BREAKS RECORD.

ADELAIDE, Jan. 31.
The world's swimming record for a hundred yards was broken here to-day by Warren Kealoha, a Hawaiian, who made the distance in fifty-two and a fifth seconds. The former record was held by Duke Kahanamoku of Honolulu, in fifty-three seconds.

DECEMBER FISHERIES VALUE.

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.
The total catch of sea fish landed on both coasts of Canada during the month of December was four hundred and seventy eight thousand five hundred and 66 cwt., with a value, in first hand, of nine hundred and sixty four thousand, one hundred and eighty one dollars, against four hundred and thirty three thousand, nine hundred and thirty nine cwt., valued at one million, two hundred and eighty two thousand, two hundred and three dollars for the same month last year.

SLEEPING SICKNESS IN LONDON.

LONDON, Jan. 31.
55 cases of sleeping sickness have been reported during the last four weeks.

A QUESTION OF RUBLES.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 30.
A despatch to the Politiken from Riga says a crisis has arisen between the Russian and Lithuanian representatives. The Lithuanians demanded some million gold rubles from Russia. M. Joffe, Russian representative, declined to offer more than thirty million.

Empire Won by Trick

HOW HOHENZOLLERN ENDED THEIR SUPREMACY

How the Hohenzollerns, by a series of trickery, won the Imperial Crown they have now lost, is the subject of a new issue of the "Hill Magazine." Captain Blomfield's article, which is published on the fifth anniversary of the proclamation of the late German Emperor, describes how King Louis II. of Bavaria, "spending his days in questing a company in his castle, drawing art and music," was persuaded to draw the sword for Prussia and more energetic rulers. He proceeds—King John of Saxony and Grand Duke of Baden sent emissaries to Munich during the winter of 1870-71 to persuade Louis to as sovereign of the largest State in Prussia, to offer the reigning Emperor the Imperial Crown. The efforts were in vain. A Bavarian nobleman was bribed to submit to the King of Bavaria a document signed with but few alterations in text. But, not being in his right mind, he was induced to affix his signature also to what purported to be a duplicate copy, which he did not perceive the first document was the original. The second document was then seen, much to every surprise, that the Imperial document was offered to the Hohenzollerns hereditarily!
