Preserving the Caribou.

The suggestions with reference to the preservation of our caribou, offered by Dr. Hett, the well known big game hunter, in the interview in yesterday's Telegram, provide food for thought. In his opinion, the best of our caribou are being killed for meat, and as a consequence it is very difficult to locate a really good head. If we are to continue to offer an attraction to big game hunters, it is absolutely necessary that we should do all that is possible to preserve our caribou and prevent them from deteriorating. Dr. Hett's suggestions appear on the surface, to be excellent. Whilst it would be impossible to attempt to prevent the killing of caribou for meat, if the wholesale slaughter of which we often hear, is to be stopped, then the sale of venison must be prohibited. When a man kills an animal in order to sell its meat, it is only natural that he should select the biggest he can find, and it is in this way that the best of the caribou are being exterminated. The shooting of barren does, which can easily be distinguished by the experienced hunter, is also a suggestion which should meet with support, and finally, the extension of the reserve for the summering and breeding of the young stags, should be considered. [When a hunter comes in search of big game, a collection of heads of varied sizes is not his object. What he does want is one large head, and with that he will be content. If, however, no steps will be taken to preserve and assist in the production of larger and better heads, then the consequences will be that we shall fall into disrepute as a country in which big game hunters can be given the maximum of enjoyment with the minimum of expense.]

A Suggestion Worth Trying.

Some time ago, a correspondent in one of our contemporaries suggested the idea of a curfew for the purpose of warning children off the street. At the time, very little attention was given this suggestion, but now, when so much crime is broadcast, it should become apparent to all that an act which would cause all children to keep off the streets after a certain fixed hour, unless accompanied by parents, would be productive of a great deal of good. It will be remembered that some weeks ago, a contemporary stated that the robberies of which we have heard so much of late, were the work of a master crook. How ridiculous this idea was is proven constantly in the Magistrate's Court when convictions are obtained in connection with these larcenies. In nearly every case the culprit is a youth under the age of 18 years. If the curfew were instituted, and the names of all children under the age of 16 years, found alone on the streets after 8 p.m., were taken, a considerable decrease in crime would undoubtedly result.

We are confident that if this curfew system were adopted, the benefits derived from its enforcement would be innumerable, and would go far towards bettering the morals of the city.

Columbus Day.

Columbus Day, Oct. 12th, was fittingly begun this morning by the local council of the Knights of Columbus. The members attended Mass at the new Memorial School, Cathedral Square, and received Holy Communion. To-night the formal opening and the presentation to His Grace the Archbishop, of the new school, will take place. To this function in addition to the members, a considerable number of guests have been invited. This affair will be a red-letter one in the annals of the Knights of Columbus in this city. Much credit is due them for their thought and consideration of those of them who "died that we might live." The school, which is modern in every respect, will fill a long felt want in the Roman Catholic community.

Lost in the Storm.

During the storm of Wednesday, a motor boat owned by Mr. Ambrose Stone and Bros. of Bryan's Cove, partial her collar and drifted away to sea. She was last seen drifting in the direction of Bauline and, as her owners claim she would not sink, they hope for some news of her if she made anywhere across the bay. The boat was equipped with a four horse power Palmer engine and had a grapnel with twenty fathoms of new rope from her bow. This would prevent her from going ashore. The loss to the owners is a heavy one, as they are only fishermen, depending on their catch for a living, and their only hope is that she brought up on near-shallow water. Any news of this boat will be gratefully received by her owners. No other damage is reported from Bryan's Cove or Island Cove.—Hr. Grace Standard.

Chaytor, situated on the Topsail Road just west of "Beaconsfield" was broken into, the till filled of some small change, and a large quantity of cigarettes, cigars and chocolates, etc., stolen. The store has only been lately built there, and an entry was made through a rear window. Poultry yards and vegetable gardens are also receiving attention and many complaints of depredations are heard, but the owners for one reason or another fail to report to the police. It would, however, be well if they would do so, as it might be the means of running down what appears to be an organized gang.

Victims of Motor Accident

ON ROAD TO RECOVERY.

The girl Alice Brophy, victim of the motor accident reported in yesterday's Telegram, did not remain unconscious until this morning, whilst the 4 year old daughter of Mr. Harry Gittleson, whose leg was broken above the knee by contact with the hub of the wheel of the motor car, will probably be confined to her bed for several weeks. The broken limb was set last evening by Doctors Fraser and Macpherson. The accident occurred shortly before 11 a.m. near the home of Mr. H. Butler, LeMarchant Road. Two motor cars, driven by Messrs. T. Connors and M. Chambers, were proceeding west when Connors, who was in front, saw the girl Brophy crossing the street, stopped to allow her and the child to pass. The other car swerved outwards to pass the driver, not knowing why the car in front had stopped. When it was too late to avoid collision, Chambers saw the girl and her young charge. He immediately turned his steering wheel and applied both brakes, with such effect that both rear tires blew out. The girl Brophy fell and her head coming in contact with the front mud guard, was split open. Both the injured were rushed to Dr. Tall's surgery, Patrick Street, where first aid was rendered.

Cleavage Rumored.

Stenographers to Show Their Gratitude.

The ex-pupils of the Commercial Department of the Academy of Our Lady of Mercy, have determined to equip the new department with the most modern office conveniences. With this purpose in view a meeting of the stenographers was held on Friday last and it was decided that by holding a small Sale of Work at which afternoon teas would be served, the necessary funds could be raised. The present department—the class room, as it is familiarly known, is situated in the basement of the Sisters' Memorial Chapel and is but 22 feet long by 15 feet wide; it is 11 feet under Cathedral Hill, on the west, and 4 feet under ground on the east. It was opened for classes on October 4th, 1893. The furniture placed in it at that time is still in use, and is, of course, most unsuitable and inadequate for present requirements, as the new commercial department is a bright, sunny room 40 feet long by 23 feet wide. The stenographers have therefore decided to make it a monument of their gratitude and fit it with the newest modern equipment in the shape of a suite of offices, comprising a bank and other similar departments. It is hoped that the sale, etc., for the new department, which will be held on Tuesday, Oct. 26th, will be in keeping with the good work accomplished in the old class room. Though formulating plans for great achievements in the future, it must not be forgotten that the old class room has its prestige to which all can look back with pride. Besides being the first institution of its kind in the colony, it is first in merit also, not only in the dominion, but also amongst the nations, for it has carried off the greatest number of gold and silver medals awarded by the Sten. Duployan headquarters to any institute, viz., since January, 1910, silver medals, 27; gold centre medals, 26; highest gold medals, 5; and last year Lord Folger's Shorthand Trophy Shield.
