PUBLIC NOTICE.

Under an Act representing the St. John's General Hospital (6 George V., Chap. XIX) and with the approval of the Governor in Council, the Board of Governors have fixed and prescribed the following scale of fees to be levied from and paid by all persons who occupy beds or undergo treatment at the SCALE OF FEES.

Every person receiving treatment in the St. John's General Hospital shall pay fees according to the following

Persons admitted to the public wards, \$1.00 per day.

Persons occupying private rooms, \$10.00 per week in addition to the daily fee of \$1.00.

aesthetics, and for the use of the Operating Room, patients undergoing operations shall pay a fee of \$10.00 in addition to the fees specified above.


Every applicant for admission to the Hospital must bring or forward to the Superintendent of the Hospital, certificate signed by a duly registered physician that such applicant is a proper subject for Hospital treatment.
