CENTRAL LEATHER CO.

Makes Substantial Sales in Last Few Days at Advance of 1 Cent Per Pound—Whole Industry in Stronger Position.

Boston—Within the last few days the Central Leather Co. has made some substantial sales of sole leather at advances of a full cent per pound over prices prevailing a week ago. Since the first of September advances in sole leather have amounted to two or three cents per pound.

September as a whole produced a very good volume of business; in fact the entire third quarter showed marked improvement over the second quarter. Sales of a good volume of leather at advancing prices are regarded as very encouraging and are significant of the more active shoe manufacturing business and also of the well sold-up condition prevailing in some lines of leather. Advances in leather, however, are not commensurate with the advance in hides, and leather is not yet on a replacement basis. Tanners can see nothing but a higher leather market in the fourth quarter, provided the shoe business develops as anticipated.

Middle Western manufacturers are booked up full for the coming months. The New England shoe manufacturing industry is more active. Shoe production in the first seven months of this year was behind the corresponding period of last year. It was only 179,722,407 pairs against 213,203,556 pairs in the first seven months of 1923, a decrease of 34,081,149 pairs, or 15.5%. The basis is this for a substantial pick-up during the last five months of this year.

The whole sole leather industry has worked into stronger position. With curtailment to about a 40% basis, Central Leather and all other big tanners have steadily liquidated inventory since the first of the year. Stocks of sole leather in the country were reduced nearly 500,000 sides during August and another big reduction is expected to be shown for September. The reduction in stocks, since the first of the year has amounted to 2,400,000 sides.

The last six months of 1923 and the first six months of 1924 were lean periods for Central Leather. Its showing for 1924 will have to depend on re-

sults for the last six months of the year. It should show some profit for the third quarter. The last quarter is expected to be good, particularly if stronger leather markets develop as anticipated.

It is probable that the charges against Sir Richard Squires are being given first consideration, as at noon hour Mrs. Harsant was called as a witness.

Francas Near Prince's Rink

CYRIL POWER VICTIM OF STABBING AFFRAY

As a result of a row which began in the Prince's Rink last night and ended outside the building, Cyril Power, Signal Hill Road, New Brunswick, was stabbed in the chest by two knife wounds in his body, and Robert Sears is held by the police on a charge of attempted murder.

Both young men, apparently under the influence of liquor, attended the Band Concert in the rink and a quarrel between them arose. It was supposed to be the outcome of a quarrel which took place last year. The men went outside the building to settle matters and, diverting themselves of their clothing, pummeled each other with their fists. As the fight progressed Power was seen to stagger, when a young man David Cooper, interferred and grabbed something from the hand of Sears. It was a white handled knife with a blade, about 3 inches long. Power in the meantime had collapsed and when he was taken to the rink, it was found that he had been stabbed. Doctors were called for, and Dr. Fox arriving, he quickly ordered the injured man to the General Hospital, whence he was taken in the ambulance. The Inspector General had, in the meantime, been communicated with and was soon on the scene, with Inspector Noseworthy and Sergeant O'Keefe, and posting police on the doors, no one was allowed in or out whilst an investigation of the affair was being held, several of those present being examined. In the meantime Sears had disappeared, and it was impossible to find out where he was. The nightwatch located him at 12:30 a.m. at the home of his sister on Barter's Hill and placed him under arrest. Power was unconscious early this morning but since he has undergone an operation and is progressing favourably. He was wounded in two places, on either side of his body just above the kidneys and is suffering much from loss of blood.

Magistrate's Court

A labourer named Snow was arraigned before court this morning charged with the larceny of 3 watches and one alarm clock, valued at \$8.70 from the store of Mr. D. E. Pelley. Owing to the crown not being ready to proceed, the accused was not asked to plead; and was remanded for eight days.

The defendant who refused to obey a summons yesterday in a lewd and abusive language case, appeared this morning. The charge against him was dismissed.

Robert Sears arrested last night in connection with the stabbing affair, was brought before the court this morning before Judge Morris at 11 a.m. when he was charged with the following indictment:

"That you, the said Robert Sears, at St. John's, on the 8th day of October, inst., on one Cyril Power, feloniously and unlawfully did wound with intent to do him death, and thereby feloniously, wilfully and maliciously aforethought the said Cyril Power to kill and murder, contrary to the Statutes." The accused was not asked to plead and was held on remand pending further developments.

A drunk was discharged.

An architect convicted of driving a motor cycle without a number was fined \$10.

A taxi driver for parking his motor car on the public street between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. was ordered to pay costs.

A case for assault between servant and mistress was withdrawn.

Presentation of Prizes

At St. Joseph's Hall to-night there will be presented to the winners the prizes offered by Mr. H. D. Reid for the winners of the Championship Race at St. Joseph's Regatta. This race was contested by a crew from the city stroked by T. Kearney and a crew from Outer Cove. The race, it will be remembered, created quite a deal of interest, and was won by the city crew after a hard struggle. Mr. Reid's prizes consist of handsome gold watches, and are said to be the best prizes ever given for a boat race in the city. To-night's affair is open to all interested.

Shark in Waters Near Cuckhold's Cove

Residents in the vicinity of Cuckhold's Cove have been rather alarmed the past few days over the appearance of a large shark which has been seen in the waters near Cuckhold's Cove. Yesterday a number of men armed with guns were out searching for the visitor, but the water was too black and muddy to see anything. The shark, they say, is of an immense size and is the first seen in local waters for a number of years.

Stores Opening at Night

FOR FALL TRADE.

Yesterday afternoon a meeting of the Importers' Association was held in the Board of Trade Rooms, when it was decided to keep the stores open until 9.30 p.m. from Monday next. This decision was arrived at owing to the fall trade beginning earlier than usual. The arrangement will hold good until November 10th, and in the meantime another meeting will be held to decide on action after that date. The meeting also decided to make November 11th, Armistice Day, a whole holiday.

Besco Vice President in City

Besco Vice President J. E. McLurg and Superintendent of Mines and Quarries H. B. Gills are at present in the city having arrived from Bell Island yesterday where they have been inspecting the mines. Speaking to a Telegram reporter Mr. McLurg stated that it was too early in the season to make any predictions regarding operations at Wabana during the coming winter as processes of purchase are not prepared to close for definite tonnage for next year. "It will probably be six weeks yet before a definite winter program can be set," he said. "In the meantime the business in sight is sufficient to keep the mines in operation until the first or middle of December."

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

KING DISSOLVES PARLIAMENT.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
King George was waited on by Premier MacDonald this morning following the Government's defeat in the House of Commons last night and agreed to a dissolution of Parliament. Mr. MacDonald left Buckingham Palace after an audience which began at 10 o'clock and lasted an hour. It was officially announced that he had asked the King for a dissolution of Parliament, in line with his previously announced policy of appealing to the country through a general election, to approve of the course pursued by his Government.

A HIGH ADVENTURE OF GOVERNMENT.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
The Government's defeat last night came in the form of a passage by a vote of 364 to 198, of the Liberal motion demanding the investigation of Attorney General Hastings' withdrawal of the prosecution in the case of James Campbell, acting Editor of the Communist Workers' Weekly, who was charged with inciting his Majesty's forces to sedition. A straight motion of censure fostered by the Conservatives, previously had been defeated by 369 to 193 votes to make way for the Liberal amendment. During the debate which at times brought scenes of excitement, the Premier disclaimed any friendship on part of the Labor Government for the Communists, or their policies, and announced that the passage of either the Conservative motion, or the Liberal Amendment would be taken as vote of lack of confidence in the Government. "It will be the end," he added, "of what members on both sides of the House will agree, has been a high adventure of Government, which I think has contributed much to the honor of our country, and to our social stability, and when the country has the opportunity of passing a verdict upon it, it will come again." The formal dissolution of parliament may be delayed few days to enable the Government to pass the Irish Boundary Commission Bill, through its final stages, and clear up other business, but it is generally expected the usual machinery will be set going to the election for November 8th, or at the latest December 15.

NIPPON TO TAKE RESOLUTE STEP.

TOKYO, Oct. 9.
The Selyukai, one of the parties in Diet, supporting the present Government with general Meoying passed a resolution declaring that in view of Japan's special position in Manchuria, and Mongolia, the Government must take resolute steps to maintain peace in those regions."

MANY KILLED IN PARIS-ROME EXPRESS WRECK.

ROME, Oct. 9.
Madam Qujano Wallis, wife of the Colombian Minister to Italy, was killed, and Madame Calderon Alisi, wife of the Colombian Minister to France, who was travelling with her, was slightly injured yesterday, when the Paris-Rome express was wrecked at

Santa Margherita, near Genoa. Five other persons in addition to Madame Wallis met death in the wreck, while 15 or more persons were injured.

MOB VIOLENCE.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.
William Bell, 32 negro was pounded to death by a crowd of men and boys, on the West side, last night after he had been charged with assault on a young girl.
