MILLER BILL WILL GO SOME OF THE DISTANCE

Removes Some of the Objectionable Features From Racing

THE GET-RICH-QUICK AMBITIONS OF YOUNG

Albertan Correspondent Discusses the Outcome of the Debate

Ottawa, April 26.—The realization of the prediction made in this correspondence last week that the death of the original Miller bill, which was designed to put an end to the business of race track gambling, was not the end of the agitation for the suppression of that evil, but that the principle involved would continue to be a live issue until it was put upon the statute books of Canada, has come somewhat more expeditiously than even its warmest advocates anticipated would be the case.

It was scarcely to be expected, when the original measure failed in the house of commons, that time would be found again this session for further consideration of the subject, but as intimated, there was a considerable number of members whose sympathies were with the principle of the bill who felt it was too drastic in the detail of its terms yet who believed that the need of legislation to suppress race track gambling as a business was so pressing that the session ought not to be permitted to pass without the enactment of a law calculated to restrict the sport, and to remove the objectionable phase of it that had grown up wherein horse racing had come to be held on in the interest of the gamblers, instead of the betting on races being incident to an enjoyment of the sport.

This feeling was so strong and so general that it led to conferences between Mr. Miller and the supporters of the original bill and those who were favorable to the principle of the measure but did not support it on the ground that the stringency of its terms constituted an infringement upon individual privileges. These conferences led to the framing of a compromise measure which, while it did not give all Mr. Miller had contended for, was a step so far in the right direction that he and those who followed him in the movement, felt that the country ought not to be deprived of the benefits that would accrue from a law according society so large a measure of protection.

Accordingly, when on Friday evening last, Mr. Miller, who was again accorded leadership in the matter, requested further consideration of the question, the temper of the house majority towards remedial legislation was made manifest by the fact that not an objection was raised, and the reconstructed measure went through without a dissenting voice.

The new bill will go a long way towards eradicating the evil of race track gambling and will certainly remove its most objectionable feature, the menace that restricted bookmaking had become to society. One of the chief concessions is that it limits race meetings to seven days and forbids the holding of more than two such meetings on any one track in any year. It prohibits bookmaking altogether except within racing enclosures during the season when the pool rooms with their attendant evils.

One of the most meritorious features of the new measure is that it removes the temptation for young men and others of small means to try and get rich quick or to try to better their fortunes by playing the races, and if it did nothing more than that, most people will agree that it justifies the course of those who led the movement against race track gambling in accepting it as the largest measure of protection to society they were able to secure.

There will be good people no doubt, who will contend that it bookmaking is wrong at all it is wrong to permit it to be carried on during the brief race meetings now to be allowed, and that therefore there should be no compromise, but they will be wise if they bring themselves to view the question in the spirit which actuated Mr. Miller and his followers in accepting the compromise which was, that this is pretty largely a world of compromises that large reforms are not generally achieved in a single bound and that in view of the great need of restriction, it was best to accept that which was within reach rather than to permit the country to continue to be subjected to the ravages of unlicensed, unrestricted and an ever growing menace to the integrity of society. They may be reminded that many sincere men really believe that horse racing is necessary to the encouragement of the breeding of thoroughbred horses, who believe that horse racing could not be carried on without the assistance afforded by the privilege of backing one's judgment as to the best horse in the race, and who, again, are opposed to putting legislative limits upon human conduct in too great extremes, yet who recognize the necessity of separating the sport of horse racing from the business of gambling and were willing to support a measure designed to achieve that purpose, but whose assistance could not have been had in aid of the passage of a wholly uncompromising measure.

And after all, who is to say that the views of such men are not as much entitled to consideration as are the views of those of us who do not like the idea of appearing to temporize with an evil? In any event it can be only fair to suspend judgment until it is observed how the law works out. The design of it is to put an end to long race meetings where men and women mortgage their souls to the Devil to get money to bet on the races, ruining thousands of lives, and to remove the temptation to do wrong which the pool rooms afforded. If it accomplishes these things people making pretensions to any large measure of liberality of mind will be prone to believe that the agitation for the suppression of the evil of race track gambling as a business has had a successful termination.
