DIONNE IS HELD FOR MURDER OF LITTLE FRICK GIRL

All this was told in plain and simple language by both mother and father through an interpreter, neither being able to speak in English.

Mrs. Spielman and John Keller also gave evidence as to the discovery of Dionne with his hands bloodstained, and of his flight and capture.

Detective Scheppe told of his arrival on the scene and finding a crowd around Dionne beating him badly. He arrested the man and went to the shack, where he found the father had just discovered the body of his child in the cellar. He then said he would look after the body, and sent word to the undertaker and the police headquarters. He had much difficulty taking care of Dionne, and the people could hardly keep from approaching him, so excited were they.

Dionne was then brought to the station and searched. Later the shack was examined and two razors found, as well as the case for the other with which apparently the deed was done, as it was found besides the body of the child.

This concluded the evidence, and the jury retired, returning with their verdict, as given above, within a few minutes. The paper was then signed and the prisoner removed to the cells to await his arraignment this morning.

Dionne insists he is innocent. Dionne has been very quiet since his arrest, and has nothing whatever to say. He denies absolutely that he was the owner of the razor found in

the cellar by the body of the child. Yet all the witnesses in the case say that there was no one else in the house save Dionne and the child. The body lay in the cellar quite in the dark, all that could be seen being the feet. The lower part of the body was uncovered, and there were bloodstains on the legs as though some hand had laid hold. Detective Scheppe was of the opinion that the body had been carried down from the upper room to the cellar.

The funeral of the child will take place this afternoon from the home of the parents in Centre avenue, Riverside, and there will be a service there about noon. The body was last night with the permission of the coroner, removed from Shaver's rooms to the home.

Dionne, who was well known to a number of the people in the district, appears to have been in a bad way financially, and he was owing a large sum for rent to Dougan, the man who owns the shack where he lived. He was also known to be in straits in other quarters. Yet when arrested, he had the considerable sum of \$150 on his person.

LUTHERAN CHURCHMEN OF ALBERTA WOULD BUILD LUTHERAN CHURCH IN CALGARY

Convention Met in the Swedish Lutheran Church Yesterday; Discussion Was Feasibility of the Establishment of a Mission

If the efforts of the delegates who are attending the conference of the Lutheran Church of Alberta which convened in Calgary yesterday morning are successful, this city may soon be the site of a Lutheran church. The delegates, who are here from all over the province, met in the Swedish Lutheran church at the corner of Sixth and Second street west, and in addition to the subject of the organizing of a church in Calgary will take steps to organize an immigrant mission at either Montreal or Quebec to take care of the German immigrants bound for this part of the Dominion.

CLAIM MADE BY BANK GREATLY REDUCED BY COURT
Chief Justice Harvey Holds That the Northern Crown Bank Contravened the Bank Act

The spring session of the supreme court of Alberta was opened in Calgary yesterday. Chief Justice Harvey presiding. There will be about thirty cases before the court at this time, most of them of technical interest.

In the morning the chief justice was called on to give judgment in the case of the Northern Crown Bank against the Great West Lumber Company, a case which has attracted the greatest attention in the province for some time past. The bank made a claim of indebtedness against the company for the sum of \$596,900. This sum was reduced by his lordship to \$79,000, which is made up of the two first loans to the company, namely of \$24,000 and \$25,000. All the subsequent loans made to the company by the bank the judge held to be illegal, and said that they were hence to be referred to the referee, after which they would be taken up later in court.

Bank Acted Illegally.
It was found by the judge that the bank had virtually, if not nominally, acted for the company for the past two years. It was distinctly illegal that the bank should carry on the business of the company as it did, and in contravention of section 78 of the Dominion bank act. There was no equitable principle by which the bank could be entitled to recover from the company or its assets any money advanced by the bank in paying debts incurred by itself in the execution of acts prohibited and therefore illegal.

In April, 1907, an agreement was made between the two parties that the sales of lumber were to be set aside to meet these two sums borrowed, amounting to \$79,000. A special account was opened for that purpose, but was abandoned in December, 1907, after four months.

Quotes Correspondence.
The judgment of the chief justice reads in part:
The whole correspondence between the bank's head office and Mr. Menzies shows that the business of the company was considered to be under the control of the head office as much as the bank's Red Deer branch's business.

"It is true that in many cases they followed the form of having the business done by its officers and under its directors and they had Mr. Menzies' salary divided between the two, but in many cases they disregarded even the form, as for instance, during the year following the reorganization, no meeting was held, though as already pointed out, the liability of the company to the bank was increased by over \$400,000. Likewise during 1912 no meeting was held, and the liability

SLAYER OF GREEK KING THREW HIMSELF FROM WINDOW

Fore stalled Ends of Justice by His Own Hand—Was in the Last Stage of Consumption

Athens, May 6.—Aleko Shinas, who assassinated King George of Greece on March 15, at Saloniki, committed suicide this morning, by flinging himself out of a window of the police station in that city.

Suffered from Tuberculosis
Shinas was a native of the town of Volos, Thessaly. He killed the king by firing point blank in the ruler's back while he was walking along a street of Saloniki accompanied by an aide-de-camp. He gave an explanation of the crime that in 1911 he had applied for assistance at the king's palace and had been driven away.

A few days ago the doctors examined Shinas and announced that he was dying of tuberculosis.

MINE OWNERS REFUSE TO ALLOW MINERS TO WORK

Nanaimo, B.C., May 6.—Mine owners refuse to allow the miners to go back to work, after their sudden cessation of work.

A proclamation was issued by the owners to the effect that if the miners did not return to work yesterday, the mines would be shut down for six months.

The old shafts which were to be abandoned have been flooded and the pumps removed. Work is now at a standstill and neither side have made any move toward reconciliation.

The men are being given strike pay and it looks like a prolonged struggle now.

P. A. SORANSTAD FATALLY BURNED

Valley City, N. D., May 4.—Overcome by smoke after he had rescued his wife and three children from his burning home, P. A. Soranstad, of Nome, fell into the fire and was so badly burned that he died yesterday. His wife and child dragged him out of the flames, but not until he had been fatally burned. The fire occurred at midnight.
